

TWO BICKNELL YOUNG POINTS TO WAY OF TRUE LIFE

Christian Science Lecturer
Delivers Instructive Ad-
dress in London Church.

GREAT BOON TO RACE

Claims Permanent Value Is
Proper Standard by
Which to Judge.

With a lecture highly instructive on the doctrines of Christian Science, delivered by Bicknell Young, C. S. B., member of the board of lecturers of the church, at the London Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass., before an audience that taxed the capacity of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, this city, Thursday night, the lecture year in that church was brought to a close. "I come here tonight," Mr. Young said, "to speak to you on a scientific basis upon the fundamental facts of being and which in the measure that it is understood is capable of improving and even of transforming the life of every man, woman and child. Because it can do this it follows that it can also reform the world, and I am prepared to show that it will do so, just as fast as you and the rest of mankind understand and adopt it."

Mr. Young said that he did not mean to imply that Christian Science is a kind of magic, or that it is a system which will work for the benefit of the race without any effort on their part to conform their lives to its principle and rule. But I do say that it promises and provides health and peace to those who earnestly study and abide by its teaching.

Christian Scientists do not fail to take cognizance of the difficulties which beset the race as well as the individual. We are not engaged in any superficial, altruistic theory. We claim to have common sense, and the history of this movement shows clearly that, as a class, Christian Scientists are eminently practical.

"The advantage which they have over other people is to be found solely in what they have gained of the true science of life and living, through the study of 'Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures,' and other works written by Mary Baker Eddy, the discoverer and founder of Christian Science."

What is Science? Do the theories of prevailing educational systems indicate or reveal it? All theories of general education of life and its possibilities are predicated upon the certainty and necessity of sin, disease and death. Such theories are self-contradictory. They have been accepted and tried for centuries utterly in vain. With circumstances all in their favor, and supported by the overwhelming consensus of human faith and education, they have utterly failed. Under such beliefs, and unenlightened by Christian Science, living is tantamount to mere physical endurance and final chaos. Christian Science takes issue with all such theories and conclusions. It appeals to the higher nature, to reason and logic, and educates us in the science of life, the greatest need of the race."

We are living and thinking, and we have got to go on living and thinking in order to accomplish anything whatsoever. The evidence of our senses gives us a picture of what life really is, and when from this standpoint we think anything about life we indulge in mere speculation, unless Christian Science comes to our rescue and gives us the right idea.

The science of true living and true thinking is thus drawn from a higher source than that of mere ordinary human experiences. To investigate it required research of the most unselfish, painstaking and persistent nature. Such was the research that Mary Baker Eddy entered upon and carried on for years. It culminated in the discovery of that science which she named Christian Science.

She saw the vast importance of distinguishing between the true and the false, between the real and the unreal. She observed the permanent nature of divine facts and this led her to the conclusion that such facts constitute immortality.

Raps Conferment of Titles As Public Scandal

CITES SIR JOSEPH ROBINSON.

London, England, June 23.—(Canadian Press cable).—In connection with the debate in the House of Lords yesterday afternoon on the bestowal of honors, Lord Buxton said there was not a single person in South Africa who considered that Sir Joseph Robinson, either from his services or record, deserved the honor of being elevated to the peerage.

Lord Selbourne denounced the method of the conferment of honors as a public scandal of the first magnitude. He said that as immense sums of money continue to flow into the coffers of the political party, momentarily in power, there was a real danger of personal corruption, not on the part of the ministers, but on the part of those who were known to do this dirty work in the dark for ministers.

It was altogether unconstitutional, he said, that there should be great sums of money at the disposal of any minister without the control of parliament.

Referring to the case of Sir Joseph Robinson, Lord Buxton declared that this particular creation of a peerage, and the method of carrying it out, were a slight to South Africa. It was most harmful, he said, to the trustful, cordial relations between the two countries.

An afflictive experience, giving way to health and peace, or a crude invention, giving way to an intelligent discovery, need not be inquired into. Its day is past, and as it had no permanent value, it had no real being. The best and only explanation of error is to show its unreality, and I ask you to consider this sufficient and final explanation.

Permanent value must be the criterion by which we judge. With this criterion in view, greater improvements than are yet dreamed of will come to light, and by the same token, things that are now accepted as natural will vanish under the revelation of the true naturalness of an existence that has its being, function and law in the God or creator who is wholly good."

ELEC. J. SHAW AS PRESIDENT

Canadian Manufacturers' Association Urges Better Service to West Indies.

Believes Workmen's Compensation Board Should Be Judicial in Character.

St. Andrews by the Sea, June 23.—(By Canadian Press).—John R. Shaw of Woodstock, Ont., was elected president of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association for the forthcoming year here today.

Other officers were elected as follows: C. Howard Smith, Montreal and Quebec, 1st vice-president; Henry Bertram, Dundas, Ont., 2nd vice-president; Thomas Roden, Toronto, Ont. (re-elected), treasurer; John D. Palmer, Fredericton, chairman executive committee; Joseph Picard, Quebec, chairman tariff committee; W. S. Campbell, Toronto, chairman transportation committee; Arthur Hewitt, Toronto, chairman insurance committee; B. W. Coughlin, Montreal, chairman membership committee; J. C. MacFarlane, Toronto, chairman legislative committee; W. C. Coulter, Toronto, chairman industrial relations committee; L. L. McMurray, Toronto, chairman commercial intelligence committee; J. F. M. Stewart, Toronto, chairman publishing committee.

A resolution, urging the Canadian government to make provisions for adequate steamship, passenger and refrigerator service between Canada and the British West Indies, British Guiana and Bermuda, was passed by the Canadian Manufacturers' Association here today. Another resolution was passed.

"The association records its opinion that workmen's compensation boards should be judicial in character; that if this principle is ignored those who pay compensation should have equal representation to those who receive it; that boards shall not initiate legislation other than that concerned with the administration of the act; and that the employees should contribute at least a portion of the total cost in order that they may have a personal interest in the economical administration of the funds."

Other resolutions recommended the appointment of a government tariff board of experts, a tax on foreign publications entering Canada, continued efforts for increased immigration; that the Dominion and provincial governments hold a conference at the earliest possible date to define their respective fields of taxation, so as to avoid unnecessary duplication and expense.

Reviewing the cost of the national railways to Canada, T. Howard Smith, Montreal, read a statement in which he advocated consolidation and central management of the Canadian National and Grand Trunk systems, the reduction to a minimum of railway coal purchased from the United States, immediate cutting down of the railway mileage by 600 miles of unprofitable roads, and a reduction of train services in many localities.

An immense market for Canadian goods lies in the West Indies, and at the same time, on Canada rests the duty of keeping these islands British, according to the statements by speakers today before the Canadian Manufacturers' Association.

A resolution introduced by W. H. Shapley, Toronto, and referred to the resolutions committee, would appoint a committee to study the whole problem of Canadian-West Indies trade, and of methods of increasing it.

Canada was the logical supply source of the West Indies in preference to other countries, said T. Geddes Grant, Trinidad, because there was a subsidized steamship line between the two. Canadian banks were established there, and most of the islands have established preferential tariff with the Dominion. With a population of 2,500,000, the West Indies imports totalled \$24,000,000 per annum.

The immigration problem was submitted to the meeting of the association today by W. C. McKeen-Dean, as one of the greatest confronting Canada at present. The home market was credited with being the best market, he said. The logical course, he thought, was to increase the home market by increasing the number of consumers. Increased consumption meant increased output, smaller production costs, and these in turn would enable manufacturers to compete with greater advantage in foreign markets.

Mayor G. C. Copley of Hamilton, Ont., supported Mr. Morgan-Dean. He thought Canada could secure immigrants if she went after them. Australia and New Zealand were getting them.

PARIS RESIDENT BURIED

Hold Funeral of Late Edwin Reynolds Thursday Afternoon.

Special to London Advertiser. PARIS, June 22.—The funeral took place Thursday of Edwin Reynolds, deceased passed away Tuesday afternoon after eight hours' illness.

Mr. Reynolds was born in Paris 65 years ago and was a devout member of St. James' Anglican Church, and also a member of the Canadian Order of Foresters.

Two Die in Attack On Car Of Non-Union Miners

CLARKSBURG, W. Va., June 23.—Two men were killed, a deputy sheriff suffered broken arm and a dozen other persons received minor injuries, when a mob attacked an Interurban Traction car carrying non-union miners and officers of the Hudson Coal Company, guarded by deputy sheriffs, from this city to the Lewis mine near Reynoldsville this morning.

The mob stopped the car, pulled off the trolley and swarmed aboard. Two of the attacking party were shot as they crawled through windows. The mine was opened on an open shop basis Monday.

BECK STABLES LEAD AT EGLINGTON HORSE SHOW

TORONTO, June 22.—While there was an unusual number of sleek and well-trained horses taking part in the second day's events of the Toronto horse show held in the Eglinton grounds, the interest of the day centered largely around the performance of the hunters, many of which were Irish animals, which were brought to this country recently to go up against the Canadian-bred horses.

From the point of efficiency at the hurdles, the Canadian animals led, and on the whole the home-raised beauties were also able to give points to the entries from the Detroit club and still carry off the most coveted ribbons.

Though the day provided plenty of interesting events for the horse fans, the feature performance of the meet during the last two days has easily been the showing of Sir Adam Beck's horse Melrose. This horse on four appearances has carried off three firsts and one second, and on three occasions he was ridden by Miss Marion Beck.

Other horses which recently passed out of the hands of Sir Adam Beck also showed in the ribbon class, so that on the showing to date the animals which have had the oversight of Sir Adam Beck have added to the interest in the contests.

FEELING RUNS HIGH IN BELFAST

Assassination of Field Marshal Causes Police To Take Precautions.

All Members of Ulster Government Under Protection.

Belfast, June 23.—The situation here was one of great anxiety today, owing to the high state of feeling over the assassination of Field Marshal Sir Henry Wilson in London. Special precautions were taken in the disturbed areas, but the military and police were forced to fire on mobs several times. The casualties, however, so far as reported by mid-forenoon, were only six wounded. The area mainly affected is situated between Grosvenor street and Falls road.

Virtually every member of the Ulster government is under police protection. Heavy rifle fire broke out in the Cullinstree road district this morning. A wide area was soon affected, and despite the efforts of a large force of military and police to dislodge the gunmen, the firing continued.

The outbreak following an attack last night on a police car in the district between Grosvenor street and Falls road, which is traversed by Cullinstree road.

A former soldier named Lawless was killed at midnight last night by two armed men who rushed into the tenement house where he lived and asked for a man named Wilson. The motive for the shooting is unknown.
