

GERMAN CABINET PLANS REPRISALS IF ARRESTS MADE

Members of Cuno Ministry Will Defy Order of French Authorities.

WILL ENTER RUHR
Berlin Officials Claim British Troops On Rhine To Be Withdrawn.

Berlin, Feb. 15.—Germany is to test the order of the French that ministers of the left wing Government cannot enter the Ruhr.

In defiance of the French decree, two cabinet ministers were to leave late last night for the occupied territory, although the names of the two were not made public. It is understood that one is Herr Severing, Prussian minister, and the other, Dr. Walter Luther, the food administrator.

Although the departure is regarded as a secret, the ministers when once in the forbidden territory do not intend to keep in hiding.

May Take Reprisals.
If the ministers are arrested, as threatened by General Degoutte, "interesting consequences" are promised by the Government of Chancellor Cuno. It is understood that the Government intends to make reprisals in Berlin, the nature of which was not made known.

The continued "strafing" of the inhabitants of the Ruhr and Rhineland by the French has made the Government determined to have a showdown on the situation at the soonest possible moment.

The unoccupied portion of the county is increasingly under the order of General Degoutte, which was issued at French headquarters at Dusseldorf, that all German policemen in the occupied area must disarm. The Berlin ministry sets forth that the "green" security police have forced the natives to keep peace and their disarming, it was said, may lead to hostile outbreaks against the invaders.

The French declare that the incident at Gelsinkirchen, where two French officers were wounded by German police, made it necessary for the safety of the French to disarm the gendarmes.

Send Delegation.
The French Wednesday took further reprisals because of the unpleasant happenings at Gelsinkirchen. 100,000 marks that was assessed leading bankers were arrested when the municipality refused to pay the amount. The entire police force was thrown into prison.

Influential citizens of the city plan to send a delegation to General Degoutte to demand the release of the police force, who are liable to death sentences if convicted by the court-martial before which it has been announced they are to be tried.

Contrary to the announcement of Bonar Law, British premier, that English soldiers will not be removed from the Rhine, the German Government declares that it has information to the effect that the Tommies are to be evacuated soon.

The Berlin Bourse Wednesday had one of the stormiest days since the armistice was signed.

TAYLOR STATEN COMING FOR Y. M. C. A. BANQUET

Will Be Outstanding Speaker at Father-and-Son Gathering.

In connection with the Father and Son week that is in progress, there will be in the person of Taylor Staten, the executive secretary of the C. S. R. T. program for the Funks and Trail Rangers groups, a speaker of outstanding interest in Y. M. C. A. circles at the Father and Son banquet that is to be held in the "Y" on Friday evening.

Mr. Staten, who was at one time national secretary of the Y. M. C. A. boys' work, was the instigator of the present C. S. R. T. program, and has increased in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and man.

This program has not only been so successful that the churches immediately took up a similar course, and with the permission of the "Y" instituted the same outline of boys' training.

On August 4, 1914, this C. S. R. T. work was inaugurated in Canada and at the present time there are over 60,000 boys reached by it.

URGES PERMANENT EMBARGO ON COAL EXPORTATION

Fuel Distribution Problems Are Discussed At New York Meeting.

MAGRATH DEFENDS
Claims Contemplated Action On Part of U. S. Would Be An Injustice.

New York, Feb. 15.—A permanent embargo on coal shipments to Canada was urged yesterday by Representative J. J. Rogers of Massachusetts and opposed by Charles A. Magrath of Ottawa, Chairman of the International Joint Commission.

Canada, Mr. Rogers said, had plenty of coal for its needs in 1922 and has more this year because of heavy shipments from Pennsylvania. He declared that he did not believe there was a coal shortage in the Dominion.

Mr. Magrath contended that Canada, a proportion to its population, is exporting more coal into the United States than she is importing from it.

Fulfilled Terms.
He has lived up to the terms of the agreement we made at the Philadelphia conference last year with representatives of the federal and Pennsylvania coal associations, he declared. "We expected we would be treated as formerly."

"It is true that the United States has been exporting more than 1,000,000 tons of anthracite annually into Canada, and that Canada has been drawing heavily upon the United States for its bituminous supply. We pay between \$50,000,000 and \$140,000,000 to the United States for coal."

"During the years 1919, 1920 and 1921 the average annual tonnage of coal, both anthracite and bituminous, exported from the United States to Canada was 1,184,000 tons. But we sent back 2,105,133 tons of our coal, and we are one-twelfth your size."

Would Be Unjust.
"During the current year up to January 15 we exported 1,184,000 tons, or about one-seventh of the American production. We have used substitutes as much and as well as we could. We have done everything in our power to live up to the agreements we made last year."

Mr. Magrath declared that Canada did not welcome the idea of an embargo, and had no official intention of changing the source of its anthracite supply from the United States. He said, however, that there was no question of possible reprisals, and made it clear that the threatened embargo on Niagara Falls water power was not appointed by the Dominion Government.

"One injustice," he added, "does not call for another."

ACTING MAYOR STATES GOSSIP TOO PREVALENT

Alderman Watt Takes Exception to Comments Concerning Engineer's Appointment.

There is too much gossip, one Alderman with another—sometimes in connection with questions of which they know little—according to Acting Mayor P. J. W. Watt.

As a member of the board of works, the latter member of the council, takes decided exception to the remarks of the past two days, inferring that the new city engineer will dispense with certain positions, once he assumes office.

"This is absolutely wrong," the acting mayor insisted today, vehemently. "I have been in touch with the engineer, and I have met the man who has been recommended by our committee, and nothing was said to him about such proceedings."

"There are members of No. 1 committee who have been, I understand, indulging in criticism that is not only unbecomingly untrue, but also a reflection on the interests of the city, and I would like to see it cease forthwith."

As far as I am concerned, everything has been said and above board. The prospective appointee was not personally known to Chairman Douglas, or any member of the committee, as far as I am aware. He was recommended to us by competent engineers, and from his qualifications we felt he would be the best applicant for the vacancy.

"He comes to us with such experience as we require for a city like London. He is fully conversant with the operation of the sewerage and paving plant, and has also experienced connection with the garbage department."

Mr. Watt feels that the members of the finance committee would be better advised to leave the question of a recommendation to the board of works, and to let the board of works submit the matter to the council session Monday.

PROMINENT BLENNHEIM BUSINESSMAN EXPIRES

A. L. Oatman was the chairman of the evening. Toast to the King was proposed by St. Clair Jackson. Mr. George Sinclair welcomed the fathers on behalf of the Y. M. C. A., and extended an invitation to them to attend the Prep's class some Saturday morning.

Rev. J. F. Reycraft, of the First Methodist Church, in his address on "Father and Son Relationship," stated that if all the fathers in Canada would realize that their greatest responsibility in life was to direct their sons aright, and to show a kindly interest in all their activities, it would be a great forward step in the building up of our country.

To the boys, Mr. Reycraft said that the one thing he wanted to leave with them was "that they should play fair with dad."

He pointed out that it was impossible for a father to train his boy without the assistance of others, and cited a case of a Methodist minister who made up his mind that his boy would receive all his training from his own dad. This young chap went through college and received one or two degrees but apart from his academic training he failed utterly, and when the time came and he had to shift for himself he was entirely unable to cope with the great issues of life. At the present time he is living in the wilds of Northern Ontario.

The boys and their fathers entered into a lively sing-song, with Miss M. E. Griffith at the piano. Following the banquet group games for both the old boys and the young boys, under the leadership of Gordon Butler, were held on the "Y" gym floor, and then the boys endeavored to show their parents just how much they resembled fish in the swimming pool.
