

BECK AND WENIGE FIGHT ANOTHER DUEL WITH WORDS

Sir Adam and Mayor Wenige Stage Another Wordy War At L. and P. S. Commission

Tory Candidate Attempts To Switch Spotlight Off Conservative Bosses and Turn It Full On Mayor, But Wenige Fights Back.

PAY LIST MYSTERY AIRED, BUT NOT SOLVED

Sir Adam Beck, Tory candidate in London, switches the spotlight off the Conservative executive and turns it full blast on Mayor Wenige.

Sir Adam doesn't deny that the London & Port Stanley pay lists were handed over to Mayor Wenige after three special sessions of the London Conservative Association, but he did declare at a regular meeting of the London & Port Stanley Railway Commission this morning that "after Mayor Wenige had called Manager Richards of the L. & P. S. and threatened to dismiss him if the list was not forthcoming, he (Beck) called two members of the commission, who agreed that the list should be furnished upon condition that they should not be published."

Mayor Wenige retorted that the business under discussion this morning was "not a question of the manager's dismissal," and added that "Sir Adam's charge about the dismissal was merely a question of the veracity of two men."

Sir Adam declared that if Mayor Wenige had any complaint against Manager Richards and desired his dismissal he should bring it before the commission in the regular way.

Challenges Wenige.

"You couldn't dismiss Richards in any event," he said. "You have not got the power."

"This question of the minutes of our meeting is not a question of his dismissal at all," replied the mayor. "Well you told him you would dismiss him," objected Sir Adam. "And I suggest to you that this is no way to treat the head of a \$2,000,000 corporation, threatening to dismiss him in this off-hand manner."

The discussion arose from the mayor's demand to know why he could not be furnished with minutes of a regular meeting of the commission sooner than a month later, and why he had been furnished with the L. & P. S. pay lists without a special session in view of the fact that a majority of the commissioners had voted twice against this procedure.

Mayor Wenige declared that a resolution had been passed providing that each member of the commission should be furnished with a copy of the minutes after each meeting.

Sir Adam Beck and his last-ditch

supporters, Commissioners Percy Moore and Frank Harley, contended that this motion had been only mentioned, but never passed.

There was noticeable difference of opinion amongst them as to the precise time when it was mentioned. Sir Adam Beck and Percy Moore thought that it had been at the famous conference between the commission and the members of the finance committee. Frank Harley remembered, however, that it had been at a meeting of the commission as well.

Says Minutes Not Approved.

Sir Adam declared that there was no reason why every member of the commission should not have a copy of the minutes. Mayor Wenige wanted to know, then, why he should have been refused them and why they should not be ready one or two months after the meeting.

Manager Richards explained that he did not know that the question of whether the minutes should be sent out had been settled or not. And in any event they had not been approved by Sir Adam at the time that Mayor Wenige made his request.

The mayor wanted to know if all members of the commission did not have the right to "approve" the minutes, and Sir Adam acknowledged that such was the case, and the mayor wanted to know how they could do this without having a copy of them.

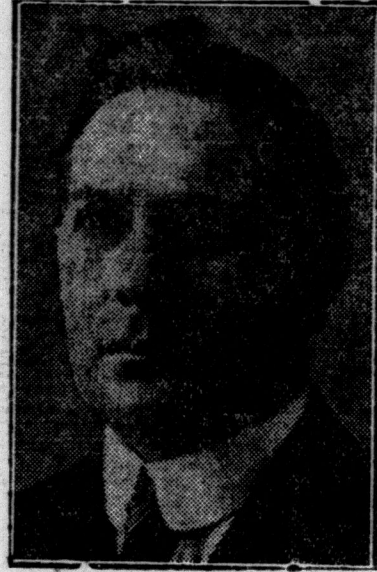
"You tell the secretary, and they'll be ready for you," Sir Adam directed. "I don't know what you are trying to make out. Let's get this settled."

"I want it settled," agreed Mayor Wenige warmly. "I asked the secretary for these minutes on June 5, and he said he would have to consult the manager about it."

After further discussion and cross-fire between Mayor Wenige and Sir Adam, the latter declared: "I've been presiding at meetings for 20 years, and I never heard the like of this."

The argument continued for several minutes back and forth, until a resolution was passed, suitable to Mayor Wenige, that all members of the commission be furnished with the minutes of every meeting.

The commission then sidetracked

Mr. Squire, as chairman of the executive committee of the Canadian Good Roads Association, replied to the addresses of welcome at this morning's session of the association convention in Hamilton.

Commissioner Donald Wright's proposal to revise the entire pay-list with a view toward general increases in wages if possible, or wherever deemed fitting.

Sir Adam immediately differed with Commissioner Wright, who reminded that at the last meeting he had moved that they have the pay-list at their disposal and revise it.

The chairman and his associates, including Commissioner Moore, tried to make Mr. Wright believe that he had included in his motion to wait for a special report and recommendation from the manager.

The latter added that this had been also his impression, and that he was now preparing the same.

Commissioner Moore thought that Commissioner Wright's motion had to deal with one department exclusively.

Commissioner Wright related, however, and Mayor Wenige supported him, that Commissioner Moore was thinking about another motion in connection with the trackmen's wages, which motion the mayor declined to second because "he had not sufficient information at his disposal."

Sir Adam thought they should not deal with wages until such time as Manager Richards could bring in a report of what is being done by the C. N. R., the Toronto suburban lines and other roads. The commissioners could be guided by this report, he believed.

It was finally ruled to wait for this report, which, will, no doubt, be submitted at the July meeting. There will necessarily be no changes in the salary list until after that time.

IS SENT TO PRISON FOR BEING DRUNK DRIVING MOTOR

A. M. Piper Draws Seven-Day Term in City Police Court.

GETS SAME SENTENCE.

Several cases of intoxication greeted Magistrate Graydon when police court opened this morning, two of them being for driving a car while under the influence of liquor, and the others just the ordinary kind.

A. M. Piper, 267 Talbot street, pleaded guilty to a charge of having driven his car while intoxicated, and was sentenced to seven days in prison.

R. Essery, 203 Pall Mall street, received the same dose when it was proven that he also had been incapable of driving. The evidence of three police constables and a citizen showed that at 8:30 p.m. Sunday Essery had run into a car belonging to William Germain, which was parked on Waterloo street. Not content with hitting it once, he repeated the performance three times. He then drove up over the curb on Grosvenor street. Sergeant Oakley and P. C. Nixon were then called, and they helped the man from the car and took him to the police station.

John Kinsella, John Campbell and Patrick Riley were each assessed \$10 and costs for having imbibed too freely.

A charge against Frederick Sheehy, 247 Hamilton road, of having liquor in other than an authorized place, was dismissed. Sheehy was arrested last night when he drove a girl home at the corner of Piccadilly and Waterloo streets. A search of his car disclosed two bottles of beer, which were confiscated, and used as evidence in police court this morning.

The defence proved, however, that the beer had been given to him by a friend with whom he had been passing the evening, and Magistrate Graydon dismissed the case, ordering the beer to be returned to Sheehy.

Quinn Williams, tailor, and a Chinaman were fined \$10 and costs for disorderly conduct. Police claimed that while the citizens were turning their attention to a more serious consideration of the Ontario temperance act, and its proposed amendment, as suggested by J. M. Donahue, London's "moderate" candidate in the coming fight, Sir Adam Beck, the Tory nominee and follower of Howard Ferguson, who is secretly heralded as the "most" substantial, declines point-blank to state his views in this respect.

Sir Adam Beck was questioned this morning by The Advertiser as follows: "What is your stand upon the O. T. A.? Do you favor any amendment at this time, or what do you think about the O. T. A.?"

The choice of the local Conservatives had no reply for publication, but in a seeming jocular mood, predicted that "before the week was out," a member of the fair sex would be in the field. That is if all reports are correct, as Sir Adam has heard them.

Where Donahue Stands.

J. M. Donahue was questioned today as to his attitude toward the O. T. A. issues now confronting public survey.

Conservatives are commencing to situation seriously and there is a persistent report today that "in view of the fact that J. M. Donahue intends to remain in the race and has in fact been working steadily for a month or more, it has become imperative to enter a separate candidate to insure that the O. T. A. shall not be endangered by the possible election of a beer and light wine exponent."

"If I'm beaten in this election it will be by the 'Party Wobblers' and not by the women," said Mr. Donahue. "The old regular party politician who has voted more or less without thinking for years for his party is the greatest danger in the coming election. Never were such weighty issues hanging in the balance of political partyism as in the case today."

"The time and day have passed when indiscriminate casting of votes was sufficient to insure the success and the correct carrying on of the country's business. My advice to every voter is that he or she should most carefully consider the result of a party vote cast on the old party lines on June 25."

Mr. Donahue explained further his own position on the question of the O. T. A. reform. "While I still maintain my former stand, and still maintain that reforms in this direction are most necessary, yet I am willing to fall in line with either of the old-established parties without relinquishing my independence in the matter of the Temperance Act. I have hosts of friends out canvassing for me and I am more than surprised at the reports that are coming in. As it seems to me there is a very strong reaction all through the electorate against the present system of enforcement of the act and as I said before the women are just as much in favor of it as the men. Provided that great bugbear of all reform, the 'Established Party Wobblers' can be induced to think over the question of the old-line vote on June 25 carefully, I think that I shall be able at least to have a fairly large vote recorded in my favor."

Two children hurt in motor "joy ride" Machine With Boys Playing in It Starts and Is Wrecked.

Special to The Advertiser. Buffalo, N. Y., June 11.—Two babies, Donald Jackson, 4, and his brother Kermit, 2, are today recovering from injuries received in a brief joy-ride, which they staged together yesterday afternoon.

The two children were playing in an automobile parked near their home, manipulating the levers and gripping the wheel, just like grown-ups. Suddenly the motor, which the car began its mad dash down the street, the babies still enjoying the novelty of the game. In some manner the car kept in the middle of the street for about 100 yards, but their laughter soon turned to shrieks of terror as the machine suddenly swerved and crashed into another car, standing at the curb.

Both children were badly cut by flying glass.

LONDON AUTOMOBILE PLUNGES OVER BANK

Car of Morris White Meets Mishap Near Port Stanley.

A touring car, owned by Morris White, 79 Ridout street, went over a 25-foot embankment Saturday night on the Wellington road, at the entrance to Port Stanley. None of the six occupants of the car was seriously injured, but all were badly shaken up.

The party was journeying along at a moderate rate of speed, when suddenly the car lunged to the right and jumped the embankment. Hugh White, who was driving, can give no reason for the sudden lurch of the car, but it is his belief that the steering rod broke.

Passers-by came to their help and aided them in getting from under the mass of twisted mechanism and drove them to Port Stanley, where medical help was received. The occupants were all able to attend work this morning. Mr. White suffered from a lacerated arm, but the injury is not serious.

FIVE DIE IN FLOOD WHICH INUNDATES SOUTHERN STATES

Thousands Made Homeless in Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas.

WATERS STILL RISING

Damage to Property Estimated at Millions of Dollars.

Kansas City, Mo., June 11.—With at least five persons reported killed, thousands of people driven from their homes and property damaged, estimated in the millions of dollars, many districts in Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas are flooded today. Torrential rains over Kansas for the last three days caused rivers and smaller streams to overflow, destroying crops in the low lands and inundating residential and business sections of several towns.

The northern half of Oklahoma is virtually inundated, with the loss of millions of dollars and still greater damage forecast from the swirl of waters.

Residents in the lowlands of the Trinity River at Fort Worth, Texas, early this morning were preparing to abandon their homes after heavy rains in West Texas caused the river to rise 27 feet, with a continued rise of seven inches per hour.

Arkansas City and Winfield, Kas., suffered greatly from the floods. Three thousand persons were declared homeless in Arkansas City. In an appeal sent by the mayor for outside aid, he estimated the flood damage there at \$2,500,000. Both the Arkansas and Walnut rivers are out of their banks there and a large residential section of the city is flooded. One thousand persons were marooned last night in a schoolhouse and other buildings.

Winfield reported several hundred families homeless. Early today water from Walnut River was running through the center of the city.

Reports from Oklahoma, where that farmers dwelling in the lowlands of the Arkansas, Canadian and Illinois rivers were moving their families to the hills, being threatened by the rapidly rising flood waters.

Bird Creek, which flows by Pawhuska, Okla., was rising six inches an hour at 1:30 o'clock this morning and was only four feet from the top of the levee which protects the city. The levee is 15 feet high, the city would be flooded.
