

Thousands Made Homeless in Pennsylvania Railroad Suffers Kansas, Oklahoma and

WATERS STILL RISING MAIL IS DESTROYED

at Millions of Dollars.

Associated Press Despatch. Kansas City, Mo., June 11.-With at least five persons reported killed, thousands of people driven from their homes and property damage estimated in the millions of dollars, many districts in Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas are flooded today. Torrential rains over Kansas for the last three days caused rivers and smaller streams to overflow, destroying crops in the low lands and inundating residential and business sections of several towns.

The northern half of Oklahoma is virtually inundated, with the loss running into millions and still greater damage forecast from the swirl of

Residents in the lowlands of the Trinity River at Fort Worth, Texas, early this morning were preparing to abandon their homes after heavy A n rains in West Texas caused the river to rise 27 feet, with a continued rise of seven inches per hour. Arkansas City and Winfield, Kas. suffered greatly from the floods. Three thousand persons were declared homeless in Arkansas City.
