Due to the absence of Joseph Corbett, representative of the car shop employees of the C. N. R. system in Canada, plans of putting into effect the co-operative system between the employees and the company was not discussed.

The revision of the wages and the working hours, which occupied much attention at the Montreal meeting, was left in abeyance also.

Today, Ottawa, May 13.—Today in the House of Commons the budget debate will be resumed by R. F. Preston (Conservative, Lanark).

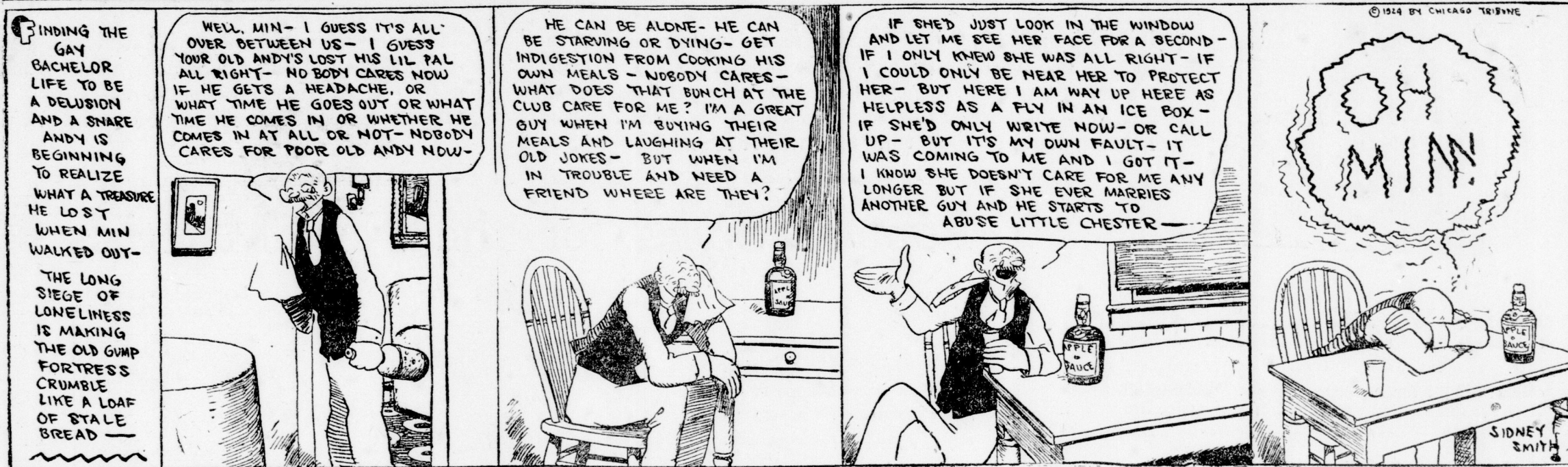
The senate does not sit.

Yesterday, No one was suggesting free trade seriously in this country. Hon. A. B. Copp, secretary of state, said in the House of Commons yesterday. The manufacturers were inclined to jump overboard to save their lives before they were threatened by a storm. H. E. Finn (Liberal, Halifax) said that the freight rates from the Maritimes should be adjusted, and he hoped that the railway commission would see fit to adjust the rates there, as they had under the Crow's Nest Pass agreement. L. J. Laidner (Conservative, S. Vancouver) believed the budget disregarded Canadian industries and that it was a stab at the industrial life of British Columbia. William Elliott (Progressive, South Waterloo) announced that he could not support the budget.

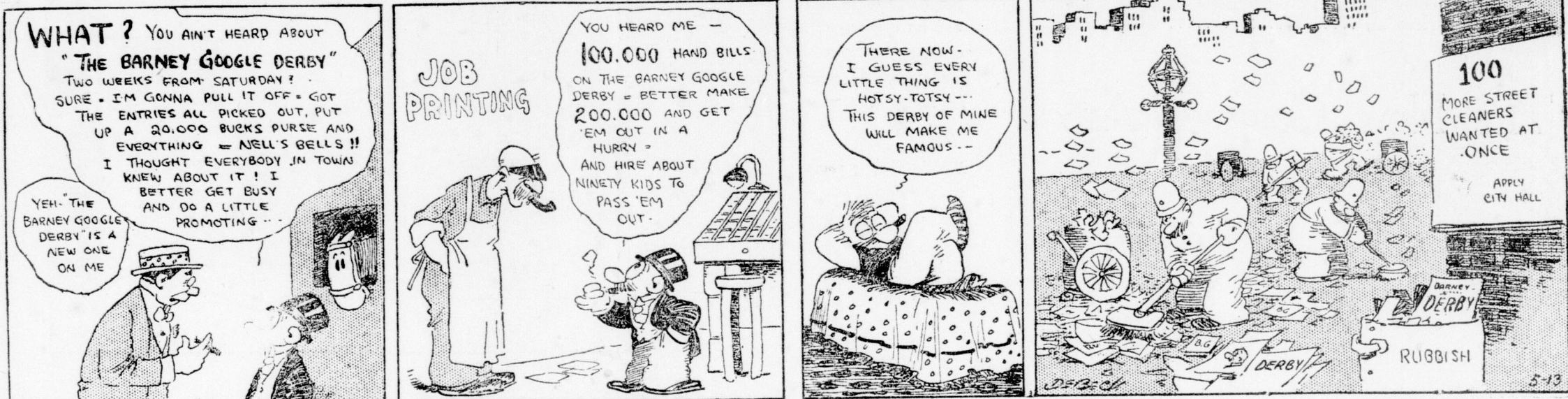

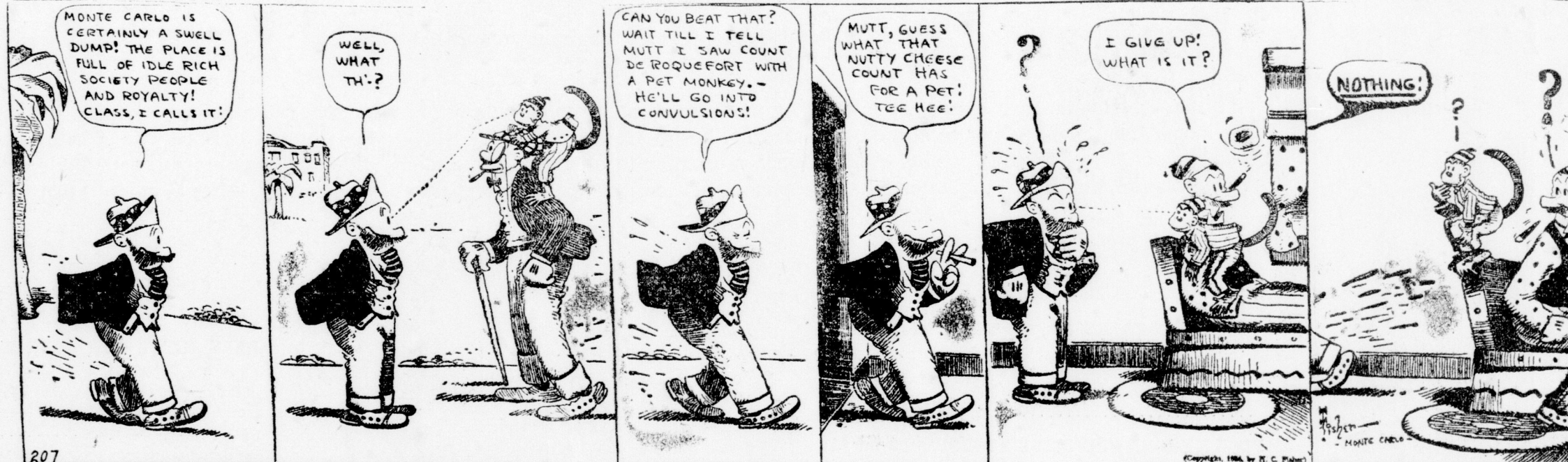
