

JURY INDICTS TWO IN SACRILEGE CASE

Evangelists Are Charged
With Theft From Sarnia
R. C. Church.

Sarnia, Sept. 29.—A grand jury late this afternoon, in the fall session here, returned a true bill against George Garner and Roma C. Garner, United States citizens and evangelical musicians, who are charged with breaking and entering St. Joseph's R. C. church at Sarnia and taking therefrom the sacred hosts. It is expected that the hearing of the case will proceed Tuesday before Justice E. G. Rose.

The courtroom remained crowded throughout the hearing of a civil action in the hope that a start would be made with the sacrilege case this afternoon, the two accused being accompanied by many of their followers from both sides of the river. The Garner brothers are said to be members of the Ku Klux Klan. At the preliminary hearing here it was suggested that they removed the sacred hosts to display them before

their followers at Port Huron, where they were conducting evangelistic services, as substantiation for statements they had made concerning practices within the Roman Catholic church.

REPORT ALIEN SMUGGLERS OPERATING OUT OF LONDON

U. S. Federal Officers Riding
Trains in Effort To Catch
Culprits.

TRACED FROM CITY

Foreigners Held Here Until
There Is Party, Then Moved
To Frontier Towns.

Ottawa, Sept. 29.—Is London a headquarters for international alien smugglers? This is a problem the immigration authorities are attempting to solve, and one which is now an international issue, as the United States federal authorities at Washington report it is working on clues, which have traced shipments of aliens from London and a number of the small village ports along the Detroit and St. Clair rivers between Sarnia and Windsor.

with their main object in trading members of an international smuggling ring, said to have been going a land office business operating out of the city. According to the information given The Advertiser, here tonight, the operators of the smuggling ring out of London have been working in co-operation with members of the gang working at Canadian ocean ports, especially Montreal.

Distributed From City.
The aliens are brought to this country, arrive at Montreal or other ports, are taken in charge by members of the alien smuggling ring. Some are taken into the United States via Quebec-Maine border, while others cross the St. Lawrence river to the U. S. at the Niagara frontier. But those wishing to go to Detroit or Chicago are assembled in London, known as the west jumping off spot. These men are held in the Forest City and taken to the small village ports along the Detroit and St. Clair rivers from London in batches of twos and threes until a dozen or so are assembled, then under cover of darkness they leave a score or more of these ports, eventually landing on Uncle Sam's soil.

London Men Involved?
London men are involved in the international smuggling ring, according to information the U. S. immigration authorities have made public here. Just what line of action will be taken by the dominion federal immigration officers, in co-operating to halt this traffic, the profits of which are said to be now greatly outweighing those of rum-running, is being withheld for the time being.

The federal department is investigating mystery deaths on the river that have been laid at the door of "hi-jackers," preying on alien traffickers, but while it is announced that an inquiry is being made into this illegal traffic, the officials are shrouding their moves concerning the Western Ontario activities of alien smugglers with much secrecy.

TRUE BILLS RETURNED IN TWO MURDER CASES

Trials Begin Today Against F.
McGaughey, Lindsay, and
Hamilton Man.

Lindsay, Sept. 29.—After being out for three hours the grand jury brought in a true bill against Fred McGaughey, charged with the murder of Beatrice Fee, his sweetheart, on Sunday, May 25, near the McGaughey home south of Lindsay. The trial will start tomorrow morning.

G. DROZDOSKI CHARGED.

Hamilton, Sept. 29.—A true bill was returned this afternoon by the grand jury in the case of John Drozdowski, charged with the murder of Anthony Upinski.

The prisoner was arraigned before Mr. Justice Kelly and pleaded not guilty. He was not represented by counsel, but his lordship will make an appeal to members of the local bar, and it is understood that Orville Nash will act as his counsel. The trial will likely start tomorrow afternoon.

Drozdoski is accused of shooting and killing Upinski during a christening.

TREATY WITH AUSTRALIA

LIONS CLUBS PLAN WAR ON NARCOTICS

Association Prepares Continent-
Wide Battle in U. S. and
Canada.

Toronto, Sept. 29.—A continent-wide battle against the evil of narcotics is to be waged by Lions clubs in every state of the United States and every province of Canada, under a plan to be laid down by the international executive of the Association of Lions Clubs.

Preliminary steps were taken today at the opening session of the international executive meeting here this week, under the presidency of the international president, Harry A. Newman, Toronto.

A committee headed by Dr. M. M. Neilson, Salt Lake City, Utah, was appointed. It will report to the executive tomorrow.

HAMILTON TAX CASE HEARING ADJOURNED

Fifteen Prominent Citizens Al-
lowed Freedom On Own
Recognizance.

Hamilton, Sept. 29.—The cases of the fifteen citizens who are accused of conspiring to defraud the city of upwards of \$3,000 tax moneys through the 50-50 split with a tax office official and two others, were adjourned for eight days by Magistrate Jelfs today at the request of the crown. The accused were allowed out on their own recognizances.

It is understood that the defence will be that they believed they were approached by tax office officials who offered a rebate for payment in full, and that they acted in good faith.

MECCA IN DANGER OF EARLY CAPTURE

King Hussein Remains in City,
But Government Is
Moved.

London, Sept. 29.—Through a telegram received in London from King Hussein of the Hedjaz, dated at Mecca Saturday night, the situation there was described as "very grave."

No news has been received, however, definitely indicating that the city has fallen.

While the Hedjaz government has already been transferred to Jeddah, King Hussein remains in Mecca organizing for the defence of the city, which is threatened by armies from desert tribes, says a despatch to the Daily Mail from Cairo dated today.

The despatch adds that it is reported the state treasures have been safely conveyed aboard a ship in the Red sea.

The Wahabites are still some miles from Mecca, and it is uncertain whether the city is their objective, although it is generally expected a battle will be fought.

Large numbers of people are fleeing from Mecca to Jeddah.

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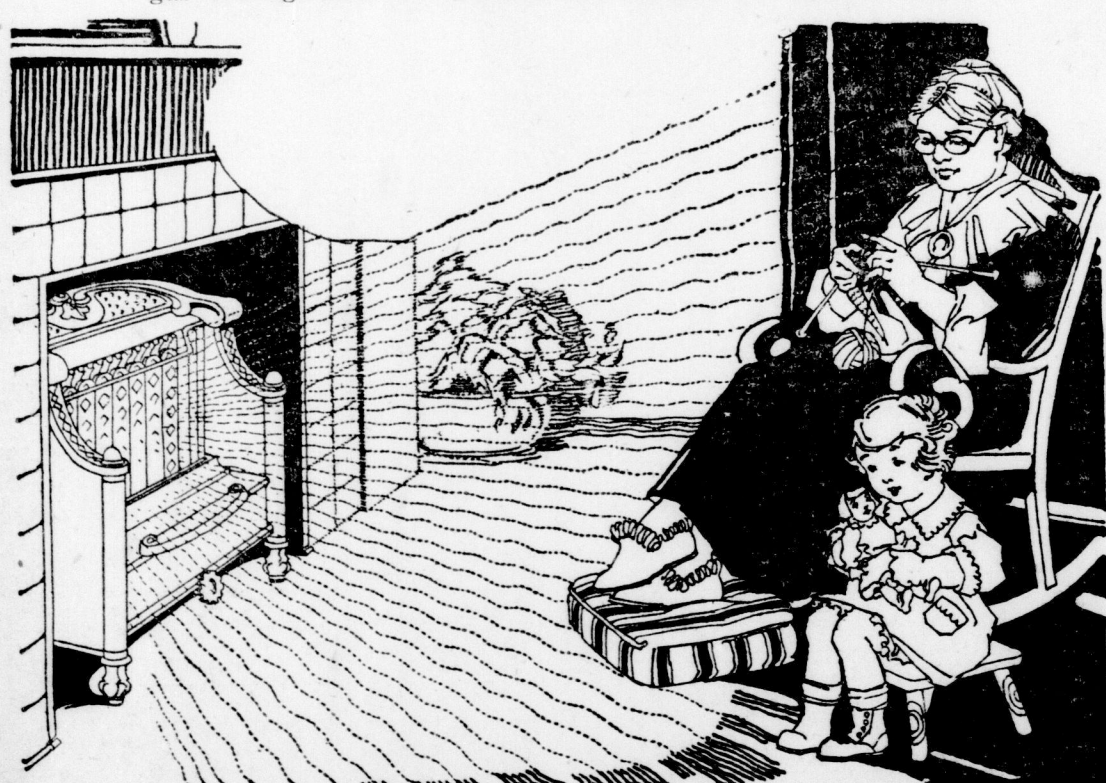
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
