THE BAKU OIL FIELDS. Berlin, July 26.—Intelligence has been received here from Baku to the effect that a permanent decrease is showing itself in the production of naphtha in that region, and that there is a probability of a very serious crisis shortly coming. On the commence Tuesday, 2nd July, and will continue every Tuesday and Friday during July and August. Round trip fare from Toronto, \$16 round trip fare from Owen Sound, \$12. naphtha basins of the Apsheron peninsula W. C. VAN HORNE. and Bibicibat are no doubt still very productive, but the yield is no longer to be relied on. Almost all the factories at Baku are suffering for want of raw product. The price has risen from two kopecks to five or six per pood.

BANKING IN AUSTRALIA. The enormous wealth of Australia is well illustrated by a comparison of the bank statements of that group of colonies with those of Canada. The figures of the former are for the quarter ending with

Canada, and the loans more than three times as large, in which facts lie the explanation of the greater profits reaped from banking in Australasia. In spite of their large resources the rate of interest rules higher than with us, 5 per cent. being now paid for deposits payable after a fixed date, which implies 7 or 8 per cent. for commercial loans.

WHY AMERICAN GOLD GOES TO FRANCE. Henry Clews has finally solved the problem of the great outflow of gold from The royal mail, passenger and Freight the United States. For several weeks from \$3,000,000 to \$4,000,000 in gold has been shipped each Saturday, generally consigned to Paris. At first it was said the bank of France was bidding high for gold in order to strengthen its reserve and to fortify the finances of the country in the war that has been so long threatening. If we mistake not Mr. Clews himself held this opinion a few weeks ago. But now he concludes that it is merely the drafts of Americans who are travelling abroad. There are now in Europe "not 120,000 Americans, a large portion of whom, owing to the exposition in Paris, are sojourning there. As an evidence of this, in one week alone a short time since 60,000 Americans were registered as being in that city. With the strenuous efforts made, together with the fascinating qualities of the French tradespeople, many of whom are of the fair sex, Americans when in that city are very apt to be lavish in the purchase of jim-cracks, bric a-brac, besides wearing apparel. Independent of these extra extravagances, however, it is not a very high estimate to place the personal average expenses of these 120,000 people during such a trip at \$1,000 each, which means a drain upon this country of \$120,000,000 to provide therefor. When considering this heavy draft on this country it is not surprising that shipments of gold are now being made to provide for the balance of exchange that must exist between this counry and France."
