Legislature, whose decision shall be binding and final. "In reply, the men say they are pre-pared to waive the words in clause 1, Amalgamated Association of Street Railway Employes of America. They will not ask the company to recognize them as a part of that association. "In clause 2 of the proposition they propose that it read as follows:—
"That all conductors and motormen employed by the said company, after thirty days' trial if continued in the

thirty days' trial, if continued in the employ of said company, shall become members of the association. "They will consent to no part of the men being taken back without the

Ald. Parnell said subsequently that he wished it to be understood that he had no part in the exclusion of reporters from the meeting. He had asked them to retire at the request of the men. 
