REPORTS EXAGGERATED.

New Orleans' Damage Not So Serio as at First Feared.

New Orleans, Aug. 16.—The storm has passed and seems to have done no great damage anywhere except along the river below the city, six fatalities occurring near the river mouth. In the city the only injury was to the lakeside resorts and to the section flooded by the break in the canal bank, which was closed before morning. The rice and orange farms on the lower coast were severely injured. A large house was overturned, fifteen people were in it, and Mrs. Rosa Walker, Miss Birdie Cobden and Miss Ella Cobden were drowned. This is widely believed, but anyone who saw how bent and weary von Waldersee looked in the story. One of the sharpest criticisms of von Waldersee comes from the Cologne which compares him to Dr. Von Miquel, the former minister, and refers to him as "playing the role of secret Generasks whether von Bulow regards it in Germany's interest that von Waldersee should make such speeches, adding:

"If things go on in this manner it will be impossible to maintain Germany's policy at all. The contract price was \$1.42 a barrel, delivered at the works. Recently the contract was renewed at the reduced price of 67 cents a barrel, or a saving to the company of \$45,000. Instances of this kind revealed to him the keen competition which the handlers of coal will have to meet from the dealers in oil. The fact that the first contract was entered into as a saving compared with the use of coal, enhances the apparent danger.

GRANBY SMELTER.

Cood Progress Being Made in Enlarging the Plant.

Grand Forks, Aug. 16.—(Special)—Good progress in the work of enlarging the Granby smelter is being made. Labor troubles in the United States, however, have delayed the completion of some of the machinery. One carload of electrical machinery arrived this week, and two additional carloads with other machinery is expected before Saturday. The power house is being enlarged, and the extended foundations have been completed. The power plant will be increased by a 250 horse power horizontal turbine water wheel and a 250 horse power electric generator directly connected with the water wheel, making a total of 850 horse power developed for the use of the smelter. This is exclusive of the 250 horse power developed for the tal of 850 horse power developed for the use of the smelter. This is exclusive of the 250 horse power developed for the city of Grand Forks, the total power thus developed on the Kettle river being 1,090 horse power. There will also be added an additional triplex power pump, which will supply an additional 750,000 gallous of water daily for granulating the slag, and for the water-jackets.

The enlargement of the furnace building is also in progress. It will contain two furnaces, making the total capacity 1,300 tons daily. The new No. 5 gyratory crusher in the sampling works will increase the crushing capacity 1,000 tons daily.

The converter building now being erected will be a steel fire-proof structure 160x88 feet, and will contain two stands of converters of the horizontal barrel type. The shells will be 72 inches in diameter by 100 inches in length. Each stand will have three extra shells. This building will contain a forty-ton electric traveling crane for handling the steel and matter in another portion of shells and matte; in another portion of the building will be a twenty-ton reverthe building will be a twenty-ton reverberatory tilting furnace. The converters as well as the tiltime furnace will also be operated by hydrantic power.
