London Man Devises Safety Scheme With Wireless Telegraphy.

A system of fog signalling, which combines wireless telegraphy with the present fog whistles, has been devised by a London inventor. Charles Edward Kelway. The United States Ordannee Board complacently boasts that the American rifie is one of the best in the world, and that its accurate range is 2,000 yards. Expert rifemen have demonstrated that the cartridge provided for the army is unreliable at half that range. Whether or not the rifie itself is what it is represented to be they are not yet certain, but they strongly suspect that it is not.
