## The Fredericton Band Excursion!

TO ST. STEPHEN AND CALAIS.

A kindly reception and a pleasant trip.

The excursion of the Fredericton Brass Band, and over one hundred of their friends to Calais and St. Stephen, Saturday, was a very pleasant affair.

The special train carrying the party, left here at 11:30 o'clock Saturday night, and arrived at its destination shortly after daylight Sunday morning.

The majority of the visitors put up at Mr. Gardner's Border City Hotel, Calais, and were very warmly welcomed by the genial host and his family. Sunday was spent by the visitors in sight seeing and church going, and on Monday they had an opportunity of attending the 4th of July celebration.

The programme occupied all day, and was seen by a large concourse of people, the citizens of Calais, and St. Stephen, and a great number of visitors to welcome their British cousins.

There was a series of athletic sports, including foot and rowing races, catching a greased pig, potato races, a horse race, a base ball match, etc., and a magnificent display of fireworks during the evening.

The Fredericton Brass Band took a most prominent part in the day's proceedings, and their performances were highly gratifying to the Calais people. Our Band is a great favorite there, and they deserve it too. They played almost incessantly Monday, and the people gathered in thousands to hear them.

Between 5 and 6 o'clock afternoon especially, the band's programme had become exhausted, and the band rendered a select programme in front of the Border City Hotel, which was listened to by a thousand people.

The visitors started on their return home at 10:30 Monday night, and arrived here about five o'clock Tuesday morning. They got a most cordial reception from the citizens of St. Stephen, and the people marching in hundreds to the depot to say adieu. The management of the N. B. Railway did their part well, and the entire excursion was enjoyed by those participating.

The hospitality of the Calais and St. Stephen people will long be remembered by the visitors, who hope to have an opportunity of reciprocating.

During the trip, the band had the assistance of Mr. J. A. Morris, of Bangor, a cornet player of rare ability, and his services were very much appreciated, particularly because some prominent members of the band as Mr. H. Williams, and Mr. A. L. Lippert, were not able to accompany the excursion.
