He will spend two weeks in Colorado, then go to San Francisco arriving there about July 22. In an interview with the reporter he said: "While in California I shall offer \$500 to any man belonging to any state who will stand before me four rounds marked of Rosebury's rule, accepted or not. I shall return about the 1st of August to Kansas City and go into training in that neighborhood for my coming fight with Slade. I do not expect to take off much flesh, and shall enter the ring at 152 pounds. I now weigh 168 with clothes on."
