Brief Holiday Before the Campaign-Contents of Mer Majesty's Speech. LONDON, Aug. 14m-Parliament was prorogued to-day. The queen in her speech says: "When you assembled in October I informed you that an expedition was advancing up the valley of the Nile to the relief of Khartoum. Three months later, with deep sorrow, which was shared by all my people, I learned that the expedition arrived too late. Heroic Gordon and his companions had fallen. An endeavor which was ineffectual was made to reach Khartoum by constructing a railway from Suakim to Berber. My troops were ultimately withdrawn from the whole of the eastern Soudan, except Suskim, and from the western Soudan down to Alashyert."
