—which will ever find a place in the history of British journalism. The death of the Prince seemed inevitable, for the doctors began to despair. One day the announcement went forth that His Royal Highness could not survive many hours, and accordingly every daily newspaper in the kingdom had its obituary of the Prince "set," or put into type. But the expected telegram announcing the death never came, and so at midnight, when the hour for going to press was close at hand, many filling six or eight columns of the paper was compelled to fill up the blank columns with "standing matter of all kinds, such as old advertisements and older news. The principal newspaper editors subsequently sent the Prince, at his own request "proofs" of the obituaries, and pasted in a bulky scrapbook, they now form one of the strangest and most curious objects to be seen at Marlborough House.
