MORE TEACHING THAN PREACHING.

The World has a great deal of sympathy with the church of England in Canada. We believe that it is almost more than any of our church institutions, is well worth preserving, is worth extending and vitalizing wherever it is weak.

We also regret to notice a tendency in the church of England in Canada to devote the church to the study of resources and both these are limited to the matter of education rather than to church work pure and simple.

Why should a church in Canada, and especially here in Ontario and here in Toronto, devote some of its best energy and means to teaching literature, medicine, science and mathematics in a church university when the State has undertaken to do all this?

The best men of the church are teaching not preaching, are engaged in a work of supererogation, and see whether they could not realize the situation, pay less attention to secular subjects and more to practical preaching and church work proper.

The Provost, we believe, has a good knowledge of church work in the poorer fields in England.

In the light of the experience of Knox College, Victoria, and others, could not the church of England in this country undertake to do all this?

In the face of this, we are surprised that any citizen can object to our paying a fee of \$15,000 in 500 a day for a month to secure such advice as will relieve us in the future of similar expenses to that which we are now being subjected to. The expense connected with distributing the water does not, of course, include the much larger expense that is going on in replacing the pipe. As a matter of fact, the outlay for securing the expert is a bagatelle compared with the continual drain the city is being subjected to through following the advice of men who were incompetent to pass judgment on the matters entrusted to them. We trust the council will rise equal to the occasion to-day and definitely decide to bring Mr. Mansergh to Toronto. One thing that ought to be provided for by the council is to see that Mr. Mansergh's time is devoted strictly to the matter in hand and not to such proposals as every crank may suggest. It would be impossible to limit Mr. Mansergh's duties to such propositions or schemes as the council may present for his consideration.

McKendry & Co.'s Showrooms. All day yesterday the spacious showrooms of McKendry & Co., the Yonge-street merchants, were crowded with ladies who were interested in the fall display of millinery. On entering the showrooms, the eye is attracted by the arrangements. Plants, ferns and flowers were there in profusion.
