## Lambton Insurance Co.

A meeting of the Directors of The Lambton Farmers' Mutual Fire Insurance Co. was held in the Roche House on Thursday, the 6th inst. Owing to the disagreeable nature of the day a couple of the directors did not attend. Besides some smaller claims settled, M. L. Kenzie, Warwick, was paid \$150 on a house burnt; J. P. Mark, Dawn, \$400 on house and contents burnt, and Geo. B. Griffen, Sarnia Tp., \$650 on house and contents burnt—the cause of these three fires being defective chimneys or pipes. Several changes were made in By-laws, viz: musical instruments, libraries and pictures to be included as insured under ordinary contents of dwelling for not more than 2/3 their value, but not more than \$200 to be paid on a piano, nor more than \$5.00 on a picture or book, unless specially mentioned and specially insured. Automobiles may be stored and kept free of extra charge in any building insured in the Company with the exception of barns. Floor under auto to be of earth or concrete, and no gasoline other than that in auto to be kept or stored within thirty feet of building. Acetylene generators endorsed by the Canadian Fire Underwriters Association can be used free of charge, when generators are outside of building. When generator is used in a room a fee same as for gas engines will be charged. Total amount payable on stock killed by lightning limited only by insurance on contents of stables and sheds. Loss on each animal not to exceed 2/3 its value, nor more than \$125 on a horse, \$60 on a horned animal or \$15 on a pig or sheep, unless specially insured.
