



The venture of the United Farmers of New Brunswick into the business of running co-operative stores has not been successful, and a reorganization with a change of policy is now being effected. Owing apparently to an unwarranted ambition for expansion of their activities, the head office of the organization will require about \$90,000 to straighten out its affairs, while over half of the 32 branch stores will have to raise additional capital in order to carry on.
