Captured Team Prize

Ottawa, Aug. 8.—The result of the
Canadian Rifle League match shot
throughout Canada are made public.
Among city corps the first team prize
went to Ottawa, and the individual
championship to Toronto. The rural
corps team prize was taken by Annapolis
County, Nova Scotia, and the individual
championship by an Annapolis
shooter. The Rifle Club Association
club championship was won by Prince
Edward Island, and the individual
prize by a Prescott man. In the com-
petition among the city corps the 63rd
Ottawa first team won with a score of
3774, the 10th Toronto first team was
second with 3762, and the first Hal-
fax Artillery third with 3721. The
Royal Canadian Engineers first team
came eighth with 3625, and the 66th
Regiment, Halifax Rifles, tenth with
3610. The individual champion of this
series and of the League shoot was
Sgt. William Melly, of the 10th Tor-
onto with 386 points, and next to
him was Sgt. Maj. Dymond, of the B.
C. R., Halifax, with 390 points.

In the second series which was con-
fined to mounted, rural and depart-
mental corps, the Military College
mounted corps, the 69th Annapolis,
and the Mounted Police, the 69th
Annapolis, N. S., regiment finished
first with 3694 points, and D. and H.
Companies team of the 74th Montreal
Regiment was second with 3640
points.

The individual championship of this
series was won by Lt. Spittal, of the
Army Service Corps, Ottawa; second
was Lt. Shaffer, 69th Annapolis, and
third, Sgt. Yousell, 16th Artillery,
Winnipeg.

The team championship for the
third series, competed for by the
Civilian Rifle Associations, went to the
Bellefleur Club, of Southport. J.
E. I., with 3701 points, second was
the Bridgetown, N. S., Club with 3679
points, and third the Truro first team
with 3621 points. Kentville R. A.
came eighth with 3335; Moncton R. A.
tenth with 3319; St. John City 19th
with 3267; Sussex twenty-sixth
with 3161; Woodstock, N. B., thirty-
sixth with 2815; Earlton, N. S., forty-
ninth with 2429; and Hartland, N. B.,
fifty-fourth with 1588. The indi-
vidual champion of this series was
Lt. Rankine, of Prescott, with 394
points, and second was A. Mullin,
also of Prescott, with 392 points.

RUSSIAN BROAD WORK

At a recent meeting of the Russian
Council of Ministers, a resolution was
passed that the second line of rail
along the Siberian railway. The great
need of the track was being

ADULTERATED FLOUR IN FRANCE.

As the result of an investigation
several millers and flour dealers in
France have been arrested for mixing
sawdust with flour. A wealthy miller
and an insurance dealer have been
prosecuted, the former receiving a sen-
tence of a year's imprisonment and
\$100 fine, the latter three months' im-
prisonment and a similar fine. The
aim was to furnish the sawdust indi-
cated that it could be mixed in flour
in the proportion of 2 to 5 per cent.

Public Interests Demand That
the Titanic Struggle Be
Brought to an End.

St. Antoine, P. Q.

Sydney, Aug. 8.—The two giant cor-
porations on whose success the indus-
trial development of Eastern Nova
Scotia, in no small measure depends
still face each other in battle array.
After nine days of taking evidence the
Steel Company today closed its case
and tomorrow at 2:30 p. m., E. M.
Macdonald, K. C., will open the de-
fence on behalf of the Coal Com-
pany.

So far the case of the Steel Com-
pany seems to be that the Number
Six coal furnished is not fit for the
purpose of making coke. Experts have
been produced some of whom stated
that coal containing sulphur in ex-
cess of one per cent could not be used
for coaling at all, while Mr. Jones de-
posed that he could use coal provided
it did not contain more than one and
three quarters per cent of sulphur.

The whole tendency of the evidence
was to discredit Nova Scotia Coal
thereover mined. The Coal people
threaten retaliation, and the spectacle
may be presented of each side trying
to bludge the product of the other.

This is greatly to be regretted; inas-
much as the prosperity of this part
of Nova Scotia is entirely dependent
on these two large industries. To-
gether they employ approximately
12,000 men and yearly expend five or
six million dollars in wages.

Evidence is not wanting that public
sentiment is strongly in favor of a
settlement, and, as the Coal Company
is operating mines as lessees, which
are the property of the people of Nova
Scotia, while the Steel Company each
year is in receipt of large sums of
money both from the Provincial and
Federal Governments in the shape of
bounties and drawbacks the public
have a right to interfere.

So far it is difficult to locate the
responsibility for the continuance of
the fight. There are those who say
that Mr. Jones and Mr. Plummer are
mainly responsible, on any terms,
while others say that Mr. Ross will
never agree to any settlement which
involves a continuance of the old con-
tract. Mediation has been attempted
on no less than two occasions, by
men whose intervention should have
been accepted by both parties, but so
far without result.

Premier Murray sometime ago inter-
viewed both Mr. Plummer and Mr.
Ross. Just what occurred is unknown
but it is presumed that Premier Mur-
ray thought the psychological mo-
ment had not arrived, for he gave it
was to discredit Nova Scotia Coal,
well earned holiday. It is said that
he intends to return when the Coal
Company has had its innings and
make another effort to reconcile the
warring factions.—Chronicle.

crease in the men one meets who are
prematurely gray or bald or wrinkled.

The late Chancellor Rumsen, of New
Jersey, one of the hardest worked men
that ever sat on the bench of that
State, was noted for the number of
important cases he tried and the
strong and permanent character of the
decisions he rendered. Late every after-
noon he went home and at once ex-
changed his shoes for a pair of com-
fortable old slippers. In referring to
his habit, the Chancellor was accus-
tomed to remark:

"When I come home late of my
shoes, I at the same time take off all
my cares and worries. When I put on
my slippers I slip on also a feeling of
ease and comfort. I banish from my
mind the cases that absorb me all day
at the office or in the courtroom. I
am ready to enjoy my library, to play
a game of whist, or to entertain com-
pany, as the case may be."

That is where all the work-burdened
man would like to get. It is purely a
personal matter. The will must come
in to assist the habit. Unless a man
has abused his digestive functions and
upset the nervous system, he can, in
most instances, acquire what has been
called the will habit. When he had
learned to go to sleep and wants to
go to sleep, to get the rest a sound
sleep affords, he has won half the bat-
tle. With a reasonable amount of ex-
ercise to add to the sleep, the prob-
lem of working the brain and banish-
ing the worry has been very largely
solved. Not many visits from phy-
sicians, nor much medicine, will be re-
quired. The man will have become his
own specialist.
