A recent United States Government report shows that wages of farm laborers have increased more than those of city workmen in the past twenty years.

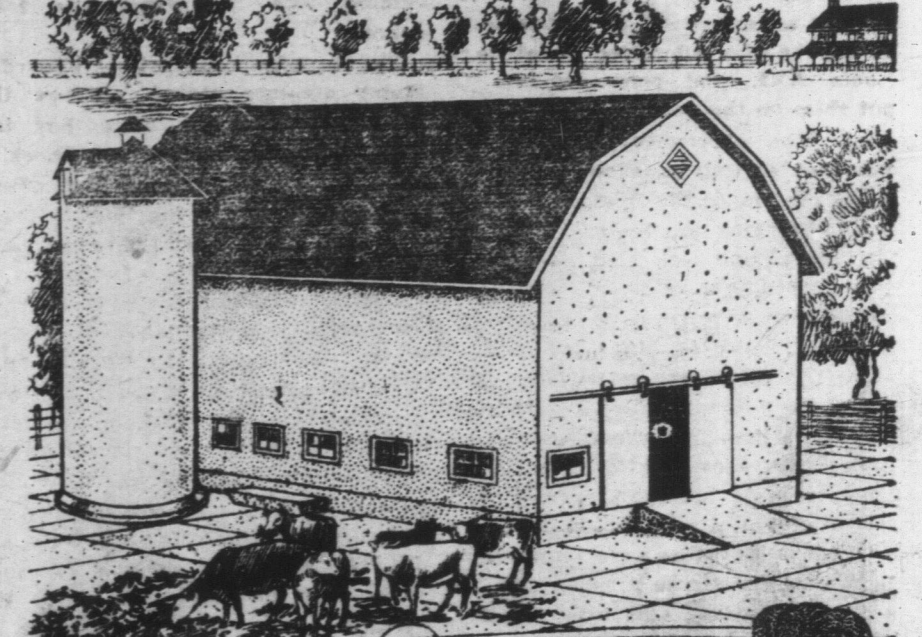
