PROVIDENCE, R. I .- A City and Port of Entry situated on both sides of Providence River, and is, in wealth and population, the second city in New England. Its literary and scientific institutions are very creditable; and the public spirit of the citizens is still further evidenced by the creetion of an areade, which, although not strictly a public building, is deserving of mention as one of the finest of its kind in the United States. It extends from Westminster to Weybosset street, 225 feet, is three stories high, has 82 shops or warehouses, in which is chiefly displayed a great variety of dry goods and similar articles. It is built of massive dressed granite, with two imposing Doric portices, one fronting on either street. The manufactures are of various kinds, and very extensive, averaging annually about \$6,000,000 in value, and more than \$100,000 is paid annually as wages in manufacturing jewellery alone. This interesting and substantial city was first settled in 1636 by Roger Williams, who was banished from Massachusetts on account of his religious opinions, and who adopted in his new establishment the principle of universal toleration. Distant from Boston 42 miles, from New York 173 miles, and from Montreal 376 miles.
