The Hamilton Carnival.

In the society parade which took place at Hamilton Carnival, on Wednesday 21st August, the Independent Order of Foresters made an excellent showing, members from all the city Courts turning out strong to assist in making the procession a success. The ranks of the Hamilton brethren were augmented by the addition of Courts from Dundas, Simcoe, and Barton Township. The streets of the city were crowded with people, a large number of whom were visitors from all parts of the Dominion and the United States. Everybody admired the triumphal car, which headed the Independent Foresters. It was drawn by four of Hendrie's finest jumbo horses, each animal being gaily decorated with carnival colors. The car consisted of a large lorry, upon which was erected a covered platform, the top of which was decked off with a fantastic piece of woodwork painted in bright colors. The roof in sloping to the supports was covered with the carnival colors, red, yellow, blue, and pink. Festoons of evergreens and natural flowers covered the pillars, the sides of the car being artistically draped with bunting, which encircled well painted signs giving the name of the Order, together with the amount of Reserve Fund. In the centre of the platform was placed a stuffed elk, his horns decorated with ribbons; around him were seated ten pretty young girls dressed in white and wearing gilt crowns; eight of the girls supported bannerets, made of white satin, red plush, and gold lace, and upon each was worked the name of a province where Independent Forestry existed. Several other cars were in the procession that day, but everybody unanimously declared "the one that brought up the rear of the procession" was the handsomest of them all. A prize of \$20 was offered by the Carnival Committee for the best car, the marshals of the procession being the judges. They unhesitatingly granted it to the Independent Order of Foresters.
