WICKS OF COAL-OIL LASTS.—The wicks of kerosene lamps should be changed frequently, or if not too short, washed in strong, hot soapsuds, with some ammonia in the rinsing water. We think the trouble with poor light from kerosene lamps probably arises from the wicks being full of the sediment or refuse matter which comes from the oil, and that impredes the free passage of the kerosene through the wicks.

VENTILATION OF BEDROOMS. - " The VENTILATION OF BEDROOMS. — "The Lancet" has some comments on this topic which may be read with as much profit in Toronto as in London. It says: "If a man were deliberately to shut himself for some six or eight hours daily in a stuffy room, with closed doors and windows (the room, with closed doors and windows (the doors not being opened even to change the air during the period of incarcertion), and were then to complain of headache and debility, he would be justly told that his own want of intelligent foresight was the cause of his suffering. Nevertheless, this is what the great mass of people do every night of their lives with no thought of their imprudence. There are few bedrooms in which it is perfectly safe to pass the night without some feetly safe to pass the night without some-thing more than ordinary precautions to se-cure an inflow of fresh air. Every sleeping apartment should, of course, have a fireplace with an open chimney, and in cold weather it is well if the grate contains a small fire, at least enough to create an upcast current, and carry off the vitlated air of the room. In all such cases, however, when a fire is used, it is necessary to see that the air drawn into the room comes from the outside of the house. By an easy mistake it is possible to place the occupant of a bedroom with a fire in a closed house in a direct current of foul air drawn from all parts of the establishment. Summer and winter, with or without the use of fires it is well to have a free ingress for pure air. This should be the ventilator's first concern. Foul air will find an exit if pure air is admitted in sufficient quantity, but it is not certain pure air will be drawn in if the impure is drawn away. So far as sleeping-rooms are concerned, it is wise to let in air from withconcerned, it is wise to let in air from without. The aim must be to accomplish the
object without causing a great fall of temperture or a draught. The windows may be
drawn down an inch or two at the top with
advantage, and a fold of muslin will form a
"ventilator" to take off the feeling of
draught. This, with an open fire-place, will
generally suffice, and produce no unpleasant
consequences even when the weather is cold."


