

RAOUL JEAN GRENIER

Mr. Grenier was born in Ottawa in 1916. He received his education at the Universities of Montreal and Ottawa as well as Columbia University in New York.

Early in his career he worked as a teacher in the Ottawa Separate schools. In 1940 he joined the Department of Indian Affairs. He later served in the Canadian Army, and, following the war, entered the Indian Affairs Branch of the Department of Mines and Resources. He has served in several other federal government departments including Treasury Board, Public Works and, most recently, Manpower and Immigration where he has been Assistant Deputy Minister (Manpower) since 1969.

Mr. Grenier has had experience abroad as an adviser in administration to the government of Cambodia and was sent, through the Ford Foundation, to work as a programme specialist in the Lebanese public service.

Mr. Grenier is married and has one child.

JOHN GAYLORD HADWEN

Mr. Hadwen was born in Ottawa on April 18, 1923. He received a B.A. and M.A. from the University of Toronto and continued his studies at the London School of Economics and last year at the Institut Universitaire des Hautes Etudes Internationales at Geneva. During the war he served in the Canadian Army in Europe.

Mr. Hadwen joined the Department of External Affairs in 1950. His first assignment abroad was as Third Secretary at the High Commission in Pakistan. Since then he has served with the Canadian Permanent Mission to the United Nations, New York, in Oslo, and as High Commissioner to Malaysia and Singapore and concurrently Ambassador to Burma. His most recent assignment in Ottawa was as Special Assistant to the Secretary of State for External Affairs.
