

WORKERS' CAMP WILL BE BUILT

In Connection With Toronto
Free Hospital For Consumptives.

TO OPEN IMMEDIATELY
Workmen Will Be Able to
Receive the Best of
Care.

Provision is now being made for the establishment of a workers' camp or pavilion on the grounds of the Toronto Free Hospital for Consumptives, which is reached by street car from Toronto Junction. The government authorities, city authorities and hospital authorities, are all combining in this latest move.

The arrangement is that the workmen, instead of returning to bad home surroundings, will, upon finishing their work, go to the workers' camp, which is a fresh air pavilion. Here he will be served with a substantial and wholesome evening meal, will occupy a fresh clean bed under open air conditions, and will be served with a good meal in the morning before leaving for his work, the midday meal being secured in whatever way may be customary to him. In this way he will be enabled not only to continue his work, as a useful citizen and as a breadwinner, (for his full wages will be available for the support of his family), but at the same time to build up into restored health, thus becoming an asset instead of a liability to the community. The possible infection of other members of his family will also be removed, and with this immunity the possibility of the entire family being thrown upon public charity, at a later date, will be removed.

These arrangements were concluded at a recent meeting of the board of trustees of the Toronto Free Hospital for Consumptives, where information was given that the consent of the Provincial Government to the proposal had been received thru Dr. Bruce Smith, and where the city was represented by Ald. Rowland, chairman of the board of health, and the Controller McCarthy, whose interest in the advancement of all matters pertaining to public health is well known. It was decided that the proposal also had the hearty endorsement of Dr. Hastings, medical health officer.

A number of cases were submitted, which were at present a source of danger and anxiety to the health officials. Dr. Dobbie, physician-in-chief of the Toronto Free Hospital, was, therefore, instructed to make preparations for the immediate reception of such cases.

SCOTT PICTURES FOR THE ARENA

HOW THEY PLAY POLO IN MOTORS

No More Than Four Cars Can
Be Used in a
Game.

Teams Will Compete For
Handsome Prizes at the
Exhibition.

Great interest has been shown in the auto polo games which are to take place at the Exhibition Grounds next Saturday afternoon. Polo in general has become very popular, and auto polo is the departure in the game which adds the automobile to the already fast performance.

Auto polo, as played by its exponents, is divided into five periods of ten minutes each, with an interesting intermission of five minutes between each period. Each team may consist of one or two cars, but more than four cars all told is considered suicidal. The occupants of each car are a driver and a mallet man. The machines used are racing cars, fitted almost to the frame, and geared in such a manner that it is almost impossible to kill the engine, even when the car capsize, which is not an infrequent occurrence. Heavy strap iron hoops are mounted back of the driver's seat and over the radiator on each car. Their purpose is to protect the power plant should the car turn turtle, also to keep the weight from crushing the players should they not jump quick enough and be caught underneath. It also serves as a self-righter. Once a car went clear over on this arch and came right side up again, the mallet man crouches, with his feet braced on the right side running board, ready to strike at the ball when the driver pushes the car into action. The steering wheel and controls are on the left side of all cars.
