The total railway expenditure amounted to \$32,862,094.46, of which \$11,505,975.91 was charged to capital, \$2,862,214.59 to income, and \$9,095,903.-96 to revenue. The railway expenditure on capital account included \$19,-966,126.86 for the eastern division (from Moneton to Winnipes) of the National Transcontinetal Railway, and \$53,042.63 for surveys of a line of railway to Hudson Bay.


