

TEACH MASSES OF CITY DWELLERS TO LIFT THEMSELVES

Dr. John L. Elliott, Noted Social Betterment Worker, Propounds Doctrine of Self-Help—Does Not Believe in Charity.

A heartfelt, inspiring and highly informative address was given by Dr. John L. Elliott, to the Canadian Club Wednesday, on "Human Conservation." Dr. Elliott is a Ph.D. of Heidelberg, and one of the chief workers in social betterment work in New York. His address was of especial interest to those connected with social settlement work in Toronto, where there are three centres, the Evangelical House, which operates on religious lines, and the University and Central Neighborhood Houses, one in West Adelaide-street, and one at 84 West Church-street. There are 200 boys and girls reached by these activities.

"I bring out of my youth no memory brighter than that of the years spent with him in that work in New York," said Dr. Elliott of Sanford Evans, who was the "strongest, finest, whitest, best citizen" he said he had met.

Dr. Elliott's methods are very practical. He does not believe in charity. "Let the women and the work-mind do the philanthropy and the charity," he said. His method is to develop the humanity in people and to train them to help themselves.

"You do not regard people as human. You see a letter carrier walking down the street. You think of him as a machine for delivering letters. You never think of him getting a letter himself and opening and reading it."

The American desert itself was not more dreary or more unlovely than the stretches of New York City with its desert humanity. The single workers could do nothing there any more than a farmer with a bucket could irrigate his quarter section.

When he looked at the human scrap heap he sometimes saw at their backs the fragments that nothing he could do would ever be lost.

They spent \$36,000.00 in New York on their school system and most of it was wasted. He heard a teacher trying to teach a little side by side the sign of the pluperfect.

"The sign of the pluperfect is a broken reed to lean upon in time of trouble," was his comment. The human hand was the greatest tool of all, which had lifted men out of barbarism into civilization, but it was left untrained and neglected. The sign of independence was not given to the children in the schools.

Take a great modern apostle, Dr. Elliott dwelt upon the infinite pathos of the facts of life as he saw it and propounded his belief that the people must be taught to save themselves.

"Statement work does not teach a creed, nor any economic doctrine. It just helps people as people."

"Play is just as essential to a child as air or food. No city in the world adequately provides for play. You must help the children to play and to get the educational value out of play."

"We give no presents, but we provide presents for the elder girls to sign the little ones. The church has not reached them, and the school has not helped them, but the appeal of what they could do for little children had reached them," he said as he described the softening influences operating on some of the rough, east side girls.

"I thought of myself," he added, "a little child shall lead them."

He had pleaded the women of one district to undertake that no child in their locality would die unnecessarily during the hot weather. And the men had got the people to co-operate and open their windows.

"We have a great Irish neighborhood yet, we co-operate with the police in keeping order." (Laughter).

He told of the scrub woman, who came with her dollar for some one worse off than herself.

"There is a great spiritual depth and power of sacrifice in such women. She is wonderful in the light of what she is doing. I have seen her at her wash tub, wet to the knees, and she stands up in the world to fight the world for her children."

Democracy must not be built up on theories of values, but of worth, he said. The settlement movement aims at bringing out the worth of the people. They must have a chance to do right. Most of them never have a chance ever to live a moral life. They were not asking for comfort.

"No city can dare to dodge that question, the right of its people to lead a moral life. Answer in years to come. Answer Canada. Answer, this city. Answer, you!"

President Falconer and many settlement workers were present at one of the largest and most representative meetings the club has held.
