KOUTERS AND INDIANS MAKE A SPLIT TORONTO WINS AND LOSES ON TODAY

Leafs Find Morning Game Only a Workout and Bang Out 17 Hits Which Net Them 13 Runs, While Newark Only Scores Twice.
