## OUR NEW GOVERNOR NOW AT MONTREAL

Arrived There on Sunday Afternoon by the Steamship Scotsman.

### HIS SON, VISCOUNT MELGUND, IS UNWELL

Therefore the Vice-Regal Party Did Not Leave the Ship—The Ceremony of Swearing in Lord Minto Took Place at Quebec, and His Excellency Was Introduced by Lord Aberdeen, Who, With the Countess, Immediately Boarded the Labrador and Left Canada.

Montreal, Nov. 13.—(Special.)—His Excellency the Earl of Minto, with Lady Minto and family, arrived here this afternoon by the Dominion Liner Scotsman, but owing to Lord Minto's son, a boy of 6 years, being ill, the party remained on board. However, there was a guard of honor on the wharf, and Major Prefontaine welcomed on board and welcomed the Governor-General of Canada to Montreal.

**VISCOUNT MELGUND HAS BRONCHITIS.**  
Montreal, Nov. 13.—(G.N.W. Report.)—Lord Minto, the new Governor-General of Canada, Lady Minto and the other members of the vice-regal party, were on board the Scotsman, which arrived here this afternoon, having come up from Quebec, instead of going right through to the capital, as was intended.

The change was necessitated by the illness of Viscount Melgund, the Governor-General's son, who, on the trip across, contracted acute bronchitis, and at one time was very ill. He is still very weak, but is convalescing, and it is expected that he will be able to leave the ship in a few days.

The Governor-General and Lady Minto will remain with him on board, but the other members of the party left for Ottawa this evening.

Quebec, Nov. 12.—(G. N. W. Report.)—The steamship Scotsman, with our new Governor-General on board, fired her guns at 1.50 p.m. Saturday and was moored at the G. T. R. depot, Levis, shortly after 2 o'clock.

### WILL AMALGAMATION RESULT?

President of Manufacturers' Life Has Controlling Interest in Temperance and General.

Mont. G. W. Ross, asked by The World last night regarding the rumored amalgamation of the Temperance and General Life Insurance Company and the Manufacturers' Life Insurance Company, said:

"I am cognizant of no amalgamation, but it is time that the president of the latter has a controlling interest in the stock of the former."

On reliable authority The World learned that for some time past certain capitalists have been desirous of getting control of the stock of the Temperance and General Life Insurance Company, and have offered

But this does not mean that the Temperance and General would be turned over to any other company immediately. If the alleged purchase by Mr. Gooderham is true—and there is no reason for disbelieving it—he can at the proper time elect his own directors for the Temperance and General, and, if desired, amalgamate the company with the Manufacturers' Life, of which he is president.

The main point that is conceived by insurance men in the city—by those in the business who can speak as experts, is that the stock was not worth the price given for it—\$400. Further, it does not follow that getting control of the company and endeavoring to amalgamate would mean the continuance of the business in force.

On the contrary, it is likely that business would largely terminate and go into other channels. It is said that this is the reason another capitalist, who was negotiating for the control, did not buy at the figure given by Mr. Gooderham.

It is currently stated that Mr. Gooderham desires to get control of the stock of two or three smaller companies, obtain a Dominion charter at the next session and then amalgamate the whole of them under one new company, including the Manufacturers' Life. This would mean considerable shifting up all round in the way of the different office staffs, as it is understood that in connection with the new large company, which is alleged Mr. Gooderham and his friends have in view, there will be no experiments in management, but that the best available talent will be put at the head.

That such an amalgamation did eventuate would not surprise anyone, for amalgamation is an apt word for the time.

### U. S. WILL HOLD THE PHILIPPINES

The United States Government Has Instructed Its Commissioners at Paris to Choke Off Discussion of the Main Point—Manner of Transfer Only to be Talked About.

Washington, D.C., Nov. 12.—The cabinet held a special session tonight at which instructions, understood to be of a positive character, bearing on the Philippine question, were drafted for despatch to the American Commissioners in Paris. These instructions were the outcome of the conference held earlier in the day and instructed

the American representatives to admit of no further discussion as to the right to consider the disposition of the islands, and state that on that point the instructions already sent must stand, the only matters for discussion from the American view being the manner of giving over the islands.

**ROUNDING UP CELESTIALS**  
Sandon Miners Say They Cannot Compete With the Chinese and Turn Them Out.

Vancouver, B.C., Nov. 12.—(Special.)—Sandon miners met this week and formed a Vigilance Committee, then called upon all the Chinese in the district, rounded them up and, escorting them to the nearest station, deported them from the district. Sixty Chinamen were taken from the foot of Silverton alone. The miners now meet all Chinamen entering the district and turn them back. They say they cannot compete with Celestials, who are enabled to live on rice diet, costing 10 cents per day and pick up the best claims.

**Held Up by Indians.**  
Henry Simpson and a party of four Winnipeggers have returned from the Edmonton trail with a hard luck story. They were held up by Indians and, to save their lives, gave up their outfits, arriving here in a destitute condition.

**KILLED BY HIS SON.**  
Terrible Crime by an Intoxicated Youth Who Commits Suicide.

Reading, Pa., Nov. 13.—Morris Lutz, aged 44, a shoemaker, was shot and fatally wounded by his son Harvey, aged about 18. Young Lutz came home intoxicated, and his father reproved him. This angered the boy, and he fired two shots through his father's head. The latter ran into the street and fell over from the loss of blood. The boy then committed suicide by cutting his throat. He had the reputation of being a desperate fellow.

## LORD KITCHENER IS KEPT MOVING

Flying From One End of the Kingdom to the Other to be Honored.

### SUMMONED TO BALMORAL BY THE QUEEN

Her Majesty Was Charmed by His Modesty, and the Sirdar Was Touched by His Queen's Gracious Kindness—The Sky Not Yet Cleared of the Egyptian War Cloud—German Emperor Will Not Land in Spain—Cable News.

London, Nov. 13.—Lord Kitchener continues to be the most entangled man in the Kingdom, he not being allowed to rest much, rushing to the north of Scotland one day and to the south of England the next. After leaving Lord Salisbury's place at Hatfield, where he had spent a week, he went, by special command, to Balmoral to see the Queen.

Modern Society says Kitchener stopped at Aberdeen for dinner and while thus engaged the Empress Frederick arrived on her way south from Balmoral. She at once went to his hotel and asked to see the Sirdar, and the two had a pleasant chat till it was time for them to go to their separate trails.

The Gentlewoman says the modesty with which the Sirdar received the Queen's congratulations charmed Her Majesty, and the soldier was touched by Her Queen's gracious kindness.

**Rewards to British Officers.**  
The rewards to British officers and men engaged in the recent successful campaign in the Sudan are not ended by the bestowal of medals and decorations. Lord Wolseley, in a special army order, issued Thursday night, states that gratuities ranging from £3 for class five of private soldiers, to £225 for the Major-General, are to be paid to every officer and soldier employed south of Wady Halfa.

In special cases, upon recommendation of general officers commanding in Egypt, gratuities will be received also by officers and men employed at Wady Halfa and Assuan. The unit scale of pecuniary reward is £3 to the share and the number of shares is on a descending scale from the Major-General, who will be credited with 276, and the brigadier-general, who is to have 257. It is not yet known how large a sum will be necessary to carry out this order of the War Department, but undoubtedly it will be very considerable.

That some of the heroes of Omdurman will be glad to earn the coin of the realm from private persons as well as from the Government is evident since the return home of a battalion of the Grenadier Guards from the Sudan. Their latest private employment is announced by The Gentleman this week, which says that many of the sappers who figure in Mr. Tree's production of "The Musketeers" are guards who acquitted themselves so well in the Sudan.

**THE MOHEGAN ENQUIRY**  
Rockets Were Fired But Lifeboats Were Not Sent Out as Soon as They Might Have Been.

London, Nov. 13.—The Mohegan enquiry was continued to-day. A member of the Gosport committee testified that he fired a rocket and gave every possible warning to the Mohegan when he saw her danger. Undoubtedly, he said, the current from the Manacles was setting in shore.

The Coxswain of the Falmouth lifeboat explained the delay in launching the boat. He said that the boat cruised around all night, but never found the Mohegan. The Coxswain of the Lizard lifeboat said he believed that they could have saved many lives if they had put out to the Mohegan immediately.

Surgeon Trevor testified that he conversed with Capt. Griffiths at 5.45 p.m. on Sept. 14. He was in the best of spirits and greatly pleased with the ship's behavior.

Boatwain Cruikshank was called to the stand and said that every effort was made to get out the boats. The chief officer, he said, ordered him not to wait to loosen them in the ordinary way, but to cut them away. It was impossible to launch the boats owing to the list of the ship. The enquiry was adjourned until Nov. 24.

**MACDONALD A "BANKER"**  
The General Whose Command Did the Hottest Fighting at Omdurman Rose from the Ranks.

London, Nov. 13.—Gen. Macdonald, who took the chief honors in the battle of Omdurman by his splendid defeat of the principal Dervish attack on his native brigade, and the master manner in which he caused the entire brigade completely to change front during the hottest attack, is a "banker," having originally enlisted in the ranks of the Black Watch. After a magnificent exhibition of ability and courage years ago, he was offered his choice, a commission of the Victoria Cross. He chose the commission and joined the Egyptian army, and will now probably be made an aide de camp to the Queen, the most distinguished personal honor open to a man of his career.

**Mrs. Guilford on the Way Back.**  
London, Nov. 13.—On the Conway Line steamer Lucia, which sailed to-day for New York was Mrs. Nancy Guilford, of the Bridgeport, Conn., midwife, who has been extradited to stand trial for the murder of Emma Gill of Southington, Conn. Detective Cronyn of Bridgeport is in charge of the prisoner.

**Can Not Hold Them.**  
Geneva, Switzerland, Nov. 12.—The Chamber of Deputies has decided that there is not sufficient evidence to hold for trial four Anarchists who were arrested on suspicion of being accomplices of Lucchini, the murderer of the Empress of Austria.

**KAISER WILL NOT LAND.**  
The Hub-Bub Over Emperor William's Proposed Visit to Spain Causes Change of Program.

London, Nov. 13.—A despatch to The Observer from Berlin says the German Imperial party will not land at any Spanish port. Owing to Spain's intimation of the visit as a manifestation of sympathy with Spain in her present difficulty, she will have to forego the pleasure of a formal visit from the Kaiser.

**ROMEO AND JULIET UP TO DATE**  
Showing to Good Effect the Advantages of Having Separate Schools for Ladies.

London, Nov. 13.—Oxford and Cambridge, as is well known, have had troubles and discord over the question of women students in the University. The College of Wales, at Aberystwyth, is now in a condition of terrible upheaval. The women students there, who are very numerous, live in their own block of buildings. Some nights ago one of them, after dark, held a sweet converse with a male student through a window, which, by the way, was well out of reach. The conversation was of the briefest, consisting chiefly of "Good-night!" and must have been audible to all and sundry.

The matron in charge, overcome by the heinous breach of decorum, summoned Juliet's mother to remove her shameless daughter, and also appeared to the principal to expel "Romeo." The principal refused. Then an appeal was made to the senate. The senate, after discussing the matter for more than 80 hours, and decided to reinstate "Juliet," but to incarcerate her in a private house, where she cannot communicate her fellow-students. "Romeo," less fortunate, was rusticated for two terms.

The students, dressed in deep mourning, and singing the "Dead March from Saul," and Welsh funeral hymns accompanied him to the station, where thousands assembled to witness his departure.
