The steamer Lake Michigan arrived yesterday from Montreal. She was instantly killed for Hamilton, and will call at Toronto to-morrow on route to the east.

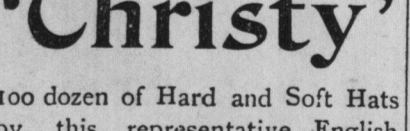
