MANHOOD SUFFRAGE.

What the Qualifications for Registration Are—The Method for Registration.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR REGISTRATION FOR MANHOOD

1. Every male person 21 years of age and a British subject and ot on the Voters' List. He must have resided within the Province for 12 months and in the City for three months and in the Electoral District for 30 days prior to the first sitting of the Registrars. METHOD OF REGISTRATION.

The applicant must attend personally before the Registrar. The sittings of the Registrar will be held in six days after dissolution and are held for four days, and the room will be open from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m., allowing one hour for lunch between 1 and 2 p.m. and for supper between 6 and 7 p.m., and one of the days must be SATURDAY.

If the person is unable to attend at the Registrars' Court thru (a) Sickness or other physical debility, (b) Necessary temporary absence from the City in his occupation as lumberman, fisherman, commercial traveler, railway employe or student, a person on his behalf can file a notice and he can be placed on the list by the Registrars sitting as a Court of Appeal.
