The rolling stock comprises over 5, 000 coaches and half again as many more vehicles carried in the pas-senger trains, and it has 58,000 goods and coal wagons (freight cars) and some 5,000 miscellaneous cars, chiefly ballast wagons. With all its vast traffic, a policy of rigid and almost scrimping economy prevails. The engines are painted black, because black is the cheapest paint obtainable, and many of the parts of their machinery are made of cast iron and painted, where in this country they are made of nickel and polished daily for the pleasing appearance they


