The output of gold from the Transvaal during last March, the date of the latest official report, was far in excess of any previous month, the figures being 464,036 ounces, valued at \$8,584,666, and no less than \$2,092,595 of gold are being shipped each week from South Africa. The March output was double the figures of two years ago, and the increase still goes on.
