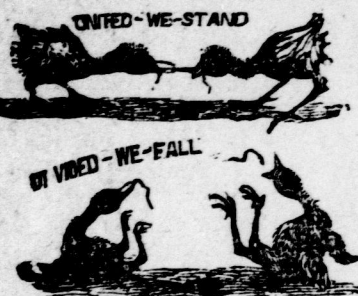

METEOROLOGICAL

Toronto, July 11—8 p.m.—The pressure is a little below average in all parts of the Dominion, except the Maritime Provinces, where it is higher. A heavy thunderstorm is reported from Ottawa, but with this exception, and a few scattered thunder showers in other parts of Ontario, the weather has been fine and warm from British Columbia to Cape Breton. Thunderstorms may occur tomorrow in a few sections in Ontario, but it is scarcely probable. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Victoria, 42-76; Kamloops, 52-86; Calgary, 40-76; Qu'Appelle, 63-82; Winnipeg, 40-80; Port Arthur, 42-80; Parry Sound, 60-74; Toronto, 64-82; Ottawa, 60-80; Montreal, 62-90; Quebec, 66-78; Halifax, 54-78.

Local temperatures.—The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory here on Tuesday, July 11, were: Highest, 82°; lowest, 54°. Today the sun rises at 4:47; sets at 7:59. Moon rises at 9:32 a.m.; sets at 10:03 p.m.

RESULT OF NEGOTIATIONS

What the Mediators Have So Far Accomplished.

An Offer From the Street Railway Company—in Reply to the Men's Statement of Grievances—Waiting for the Men.

The sub-committee of mediators, Mayor Wilson, Ald. Parnell and Mr. A. B. Cox, following yesterday morning's meeting interviewed the Street Railway Company. The employees' statement of grievances was discussed, and an effort made to have the whole question go to arbitration. A board meeting was immediately called, and about 5 o'clock Chairman Parnell was handed the following offer by the company:

"London, July 11, 1899. To His Worship the Mayor and the Committee Appointed by the Council:

"Gentlemen.—The directors of the London Street Railway Company have considered the so-called list of grievances of the striking employees of the London Street Railway Company, which, however, I am instructed to point out, are simply general, and do not contain any of the specific grievances, which the company asked for before the strike took place, and which the committee of the council have also asked for—and in reply to your request as to the position of the company, would say:

"The London Street Railway Company hereby offer now, as they have done before, a bona fide arbitration in matters in dispute of every nature and description whatsoever between the striking employees and themselves under agreement of 10th November, 1898, of which particulars have been given to the company, and as to whether the company have or have not violated the said agreement, and as to whether the striking employees were justified in striking as they did on the 22nd of May, and that in the event of the finding being that the employees were not justified in the strike of the 22nd of May, then that the entire cost of the incident to such arbitration shall be paid by the striking employees, while if the finding be found at fault they are to pay the entire costs, security for such costs to be furnished. The strikers' committee was at once seen by Chairman Parnell and the company's offer presented. The strikers promised to submit an answer as soon as possible, but none is expected until tonight or tomorrow morning.

GROCERS' OUTING AT NIAGARA

London and St. Thomas Grocers to Join Forces—Trading Stamps and Premiums Discussed.

London retail grocers held their regular meeting on Monday evening, with a fair attendance. President R. A. Jones was in the chair.

A communication from St. Thomas Retail Grocers' Association was read, thanking this association for an invitation to the excursion to Niagara, and stating that the St. Thomas grocers had decided to close their stores and make July 26 a grocers' holiday, and join London grocers in a day's outing at old Niagara. The secretary was instructed to forward advertising matter to the St. Thomas association. Mr. J. C. Trebilcock reported that Mr. T. A. Rowat, the secretary, and himself, had been to Niagara, and arranged for reduced rates on the electric roads. Maid of the Mist, Reservation Park carriages, the museum, and arranged everything for a pleasant day. The committee will have tickets for all points of interest for sale at reduced rates on the train. The committee took a trip over the Buffalo and Niagara Electric Railroad, and found it very pleasant and interesting, and excursions can take in this trip and have about six hours in Buffalo, and return the same day.

The trading stamps and premium question was discussed, and the feeling was that if the system was abolished entirely it would be beneficial to the trade and their customers, as there is more or less dissatisfaction caused through this system of doing business. No one could give as good value in goods and give premiums or stamps as well, and no one can expect to get something for nothing. There was either a loss to the dealer, or the customer paid for the stamps or premiums. After considerable discussion the question was laid over until the next meeting.

The secretary reported that he had been informed that the bill to amend the garnishee act has been given a six months' hold. A chat on the state of trade generally, and the prospects for a large turnout for the excursion on the 26th, brought the meeting to a close with a burrah for Niagara.

DEATH OF J. M. COUSINS

Ex-Mayor and for Many Years Prominent in Municipal Life.

Was One of London's Pioneer Manufacturers—The Oldest County Magistrate in the District.

Ex-Mayor J. M. Cousins died last evening in his 80th year, at his late residence, Bathurst street, from the effects of pleurisy and rheumatism. He had been ailing about a year.

James Mitchell Cousins was born in Truro, N. S., in April, 1820, and when 23 years of age left his birthplace for Toronto, where he remained about a year. He came to London 55 years ago and during that time there were few who took such a prominent part in the city's progress. He was captain of the volunteer fire brigade, an alderman for 15 years, mayor in 1872, water commissioner three years and chairman of the board in 1888. He was also the oldest county magistrate of the district. In connection with the Western Fair he was a very active worker, and was generally regarded as the originator of the fair. Although so much of his time was taken up with public duties, Mr. Cousins applied himself with great industry to building up a successful business, first as a partner of the firm of Craig & Cousins, and latterly alone, in the manufacture of pumps, fanning mills and windmills. He was one of the first windmill manufacturers in the Dominion. Mrs. Cousins preceded him to the grave less than two years ago. One son, Thomas Cousins, of this city, and one daughter, Miss Sarah Cousins, who kept house for her father, are the survivors of the family. Two brothers, Job, of Westminster, and Thomas, of Brandon, and two sisters, Mrs. Jos. McGlinish, of Truro, N. S., and Mrs. Henry Johnston, of this city, survive also.

A NEW INFIRMARY

Western M.P.s Say London Asylum Needs One—Annual Inspection.

The annual inspection of the London Asylum for the Insane took place yesterday. Several of the M. P.'s from the western district were unable to be present. The visitors spent several hours in looking over the buildings, the gardens and the farm, and expressed the most unqualified approval of the arrangements. They strongly expressed the opinion that a new infirmary is badly needed, and that one should be built right away. The estimated cost of the infirmary is \$300,000, and if proposed for it is made, it will be erected on the old stable grounds back of the stores.

At 1 o'clock luncheon was served in a large marquee on the lawn. The Asylum Band, under direction of Dr. Asylum Band, discoursed sweet music, and a most enjoyable social hour was spent. REMARKABLE ROBBER HUNT

Chase Given Up—Bandits Used Smokeless Powder and Could Stand Off an Army.

Omaha, Neb., July 12.—F. M. Hane, the well-known western detective, has returned to Omaha from a long chase after the six men who held up and dynamited the Union Pacific express train in Wyoming on June 2. Speaking of the extraordinary chase, Hane says:

"These men have made the most remarkable flight in the criminal history of the west. They were here over 1,500 miles since committing the crime and have been chased by 200 or 400 men constantly, yet they escaped. Time and again they have been surrounded by ten times their number, yet by a display of desperate nerve and their knowledge of woodcraft, they have managed each time to get away.

"They first fled to the Hole-in-the-Wall, I found, but being so hard pressed and having such a large reward on their heads (\$18,000), they did not dare stop among their old outlaw company for fear of being betrayed. They kept on into the Big Horn basin, then turned back and retraced their steps through the Hole-in-the-Wall country into Jackson's Hole, the wildest and most desolate stretch of mountainous country in the west. Here the Indian police under Baldwin got after them and chased them south toward the Utah mountains, and it was here that they were completely lost. They have two horseloads of smokeless ammunition, and in their retreat could stand off an army.

"These fellows are the remnants of the most daring outlaw band in existence. I have been a scout, plainsman and detective in that part of the west for 25 years, and I know all those fellows. I knew Curry, their leader, when he was an honest rancher. It was but ten years ago that he turned highwayman, and since then he has been in a number of desperate games. It was he and his gang that held up the Spearfish, S. D., bank, when several of them were killed. I believe this will very nearly wind them up, for they have got to put in their appearance at some town in the west some day, and when they do they will be shot down."
