#### LONDON CRIME

Out of Nineteen Murder Cases Only Four Acquittals.

London, Nov. 30 .- The report of the metropolitan commissioner of police for the last year might aptly be called 'London Crime at a Glance," so carefully tabulated are the records. Out of 19 murder cases only 4 acquittals are recorded. The burglars are luckier, there being but 140 convictions out of 422 arrests. No fewer than 1,413 housebreakers were arrested during the year, 914 of them being convicted. The majority of the victims of these daylight marauders have been the poorer classes, who could not afford to leave help in their houses during their absence. The police arrested altogether during the year the surprising number of 102.-

RETALIATION.

In the Austrian Reichsrath the premier and minister of the interior, Count Thun-Hohen-Stern, replying to an interpellation on the subject of the expulsion of Austrians from Prussia, said that the foreign office had strongly protested against the steps taken by the Prussian officials, and the assurances of the Berlin cabinet warranted the hope that greater consideration would be shown to Austrians. But, should this expectation not be fulfilled, the government will not hesitate to energetically protect the rights of Austrians, and, if necessary, adopt retaliatory measures.

The ministers also considered the actions of the Carlists, concerning whom there are no new facts, and further deliberated upon the repatiation of the Spaniards in the Philippine Islands and the suspension of constitutional rights, which it was decided, will for the present remain suspended. The minister of the interior, Senor Capdepon, in an interview, is reported as saying the Carlists have no chance of success. He added: "We are closely watching their procedings in the Basque provinces, and in Catalonia and Aragon, and we are ready to repress the first sign of insurrection."

"Don Carlos only has a chance in the mountains of Catalonia, where the people suffered less during the last Carlist war. The Carlists are working desperately to win the support of some of our regiments and some of our generals, but these attempts have failed. Not a single general has listened to their proposals.

## **COUNTING UP** THE LOSSES!

Appalling Results of the Storm On the New England Coast.

More Than 200 Perished-56 Vessele Tctally Wrecked, and 49 That Probably Cannot Be Saved.

Boston, Mass., Nov. 30.-News of th loss of the Boston and Portland Steam Packet Company's steamer Portland, off Cape Cod, and the death of more than 150 persons, who comprised the passengers and crew of the steamer, and news from hitherto unheard-of ports on Cape Cod, showing that at least a score and a half of vessels were wrecked along that shore, with the loss of a dozen lives, has come as a direct climax to the previous record of disasters resulting from Saturday

There are still other places to be heard from on both sides of the cape, which have not been reached by train on account of the washouts, and which are cut off from other means of communication by broken wires, blocked

## PLOT DISCOVERED

To Assassinate Prince Ferdinand of Bulgaria.

London, Nov. 30 .- Special dispatches from Budapest, published here this afternoon, says that a plot to assassinate Prince Ferdinand of Bulgaria has been discovered at Sofia. It is added that numerous arrests have been made.

Prince Ferdinand of Bulgaria, the youngest son of the late Prince Augustus of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha and Princess Clementine of Bourbon-Orleans (daughter of King Louis Philippe), was born Feb. 26, 1861, and was elected Prince of Bulgaria by the unanimous vote of the national as-sembly on July 7, 1887. He assumed the government on Aug. 14, 1887, in succession to Prince Alexander, who abdicated Sept. 7, 1886. Prince Ferdinand's election was confirmed by the Turkish Government and by the great powers in March, 1896. He was married on April 20, 1893, to Marie Louise, eldest daughter of Duke Robert of Parma. They have two sons and a daughter.
