**Religion in the Schools.**

Dr. Armstrong then went on to discuss religious teaching in public schools. He said the primary responsibility for the children must rest upon the parents, but the greater part of the work of instruction is done in the schools. The schools and the school teachers should therefore be expected to co-operate with the home in training a godly seed. The state in a large part of this continent invades the home and takes possession of the children, and issues a mandate to parents. "You must send your children to our schools, and you must pay for them, but remember, we will exclude your Bible and religion." This is in effect for Christian parents all the elements of injustice and tyranny.

The state does not exist apart from the people who compose it. Christian parents should assert the right of their children to a Christian education—in the school which they support. In a Christian country like ours the Christian church and the systems of education should know no disagreement as to aim or method, but should be in harmony in the attainment of a perfect training of the young. No Christian parent should be content to have his children attend a school where religion is ignored or put in a corner, and no government has a right to exclude religion from a school which it compels Christian people to support.

**State More and More Paternal.**

The state is becoming more and more paternal. It does not confine itself to the administration of justice or to the protection of our persons and our property, or the matters affecting our social progress. It takes under its care the mental and moral welfare of the people, discerning that the greatness of a nation is reared not on physical but on spiritual foundations. Education in our school system should be conceived not from the utilitarian standpoint chiefly, but from the ethical. We, as loyal Canadians, can acknowledge no system of education as ideal or liberal, from which education is excluded. Christian ethics should be the basis of the curriculum of our public schools, high schools and universities.

The church should move firmly and rapidly adopting new methods and insisting that religion take its right place in the system of education into a system of education into which we are compelled to fit our children.

**The Dispute in England.**

In England today the whole community is agitated—the very foundations of society quiver—foe meets foe in deadly shock of words battle. The dispute is to determine how far religion shall enter into the school system of the land. All that is contemplated is simple instruction in the Bible and the fundamental truths of religion. The introduction of so much religious instruction in our schools would incur little difficulty, and would do much good. In the Protestant schools of Quebec we see a practical solution of the problem. There, for all grades in the elementary and intermediate schools there is provided a course of religious instruction, which is obligatory unless where exemption is asked in writing by parents. Besides this a little catechism of truths held generally by Christians, an excellent compend of fundamental principles of Christian doctrine has been agreed upon and authorized by the committee of public instruction. The ignorance of the rising generation of the facts of the Bible is calling for remedy.

**Bible Not Taught in Schools.**

The Bible is not taught in our schools—even the map of Palestine has no prominent place. Religious education in schools will have a good influence on all classes, for no matter how degraded the home, the children must attend school.

The prominence of "graft" in political and municipal matters, the methods of insurance companies, the trade combines, and the constant reports of defaulters and embezzlers, go to show that something must be done to purify and strengthen the moral fiber of the nation. The only remedy for this state of affairs is proper religious training. "Whatever a man sows that also he will reap." A state church is not contended for. The church in the past has done a large share of the best educational work, and must continue. The Sunday school is doing a good work, but the more effort made the more limited the scope of the Sunday school appears. There is so little time, only a few hours a week, that it limits the possibilities. The religious habit cannot be established by the Sunday school, but by parents at home and by teachers in school, during the six days of the week. Where the church recognizes her duty, the child will be placed in the midst, his attention to the church and to Christ clearly recognized, his nature studied, and his education and training placed on a religiously scientific basis.
