

VALPARAISO IS AGAIN SHAKEN

Earthquakes Yesterday and Fires Break Out Afresh.

ONE-HALF CITY IS DESTROYED

New York Firm Hear from Agents That Estimate of the Dead Is Two Thousand.

New York, Aug. 22.—A cable message received from Valparaiso by the way of Lima, Peru, by Wergar & Co., of this city, today, read as follows:

"The city (Valparaiso) is almost annihilated. Fires are still raging." The message was dated at Lima today, having been received there from the firms of representatives in Valparaiso.

London, Aug. 22.—A cable dispatch filed late last night by the agent at Valparaiso of Hupis & Co. says that slight shocks continue, and that further large fires have occurred there.

New York, Aug. 22.—Wessel, Duval & Co. today received from their branch in Valparaiso the following cablegram, which had been delayed in transmission:

"About one-half of the city of Valparaiso is destroyed, and the balance damaged. Our offices apparently quite safe. More than 2,000 killed or injured. Population camping out. Our steamers safe."

New York, Aug. 22.—Adolfo Ortiz, consul-general for Chili, said yesterday that he believed Valparaiso would be rebuilt within six months, and that trade would be completely re-established before that time. The Chilean representative's optimistic prediction as to trade was favorably seconded by several merchants who do business with the stricken city, though they did not believe that the damage done by quake and fire could be repaired in the time set by the consul-general.

CRIME RAMPANT IN ST. PETERSBURG

Wholesale Murder of Government Officials Continues.

ASSASSINS GENERALLY ESCAPE

A Large Batch of Political Prisoners Shipped Off to Siberia—Peasants Buying the Land.

Moscow, Aug. 22.—One hundred and fifty political prisoners exiled by administrative order started for Siberia today.

Warsaw, Aug. 22.—An unknown man today shot and slightly wounded Count Fernor, a colonel of gendarmes. A patrol of soldiers replied with a volley, killing two passers-by.

Deshlagar, Russia, Aug. 22.—An agitator and four soldiers were executed here today as ringleaders in the recent mutiny.

Selling the Land.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 22.—Official statistics show the extent of the panic among the land owners. Since last November 1,762,557 dessiatines (a dessiatine is a little over two and a half acres) of land were offered to the peasants' bank at \$3 per dessiatine, but the amount actually bought and sold to the peasants is not stated. The bank is selling the land to the peasants on easy terms. In some places it is said the land question is settling itself by this method.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 22.—In spite of the wholesale arrests and deportation of revolutionists, the big centers' daily chronicles of murder and robbery are not appreciably diminishing. The police seem to be utterly powerless to capture the criminals. They do not make an arrest in one case out of 25. While the revolutionary opposition to the Government has thus degenerated into a campaign of crime the three political parties, the Constitutional Democrats, Octoberists and Regenerationists, are drifting. The efforts to effect an amalgamation have failed and all the leaders seem to be greatly at sea as to what tactics to pursue. The Rech, which reappeared today, makes an attempt to analyze the situation, but evidently, it does not know which way to turn.

Assassin Escapes.

Melnikoff, who was connected with the conspiracy which was responsible for the assassination of Former Minister of Public Instruction Bogolepoff, in company with Hasonoff, the assassin of Former Minister of the Interior Von Plehve, and several other terrorists, has escaped from Askaniya, Trans-Balkania. This party was the last batch of prisoners taken from the Schusselburg fortress. It is announced that some amelioration of the conditions of the Jews will be made without awaiting the action of Parliament. A commission is now sitting at the ministry of the interior elaborating a general project of law, whose provisions, however, will only include an extension of the limits of the pale of residence and an extension of the rights of higher education.

Rebel Rescued.

Tsarsitsin, Province of Saratov, Aug. 22.—A divinity student named Ilyin, who was arrested in the village of Garbhedra for activity in the revolutionary propaganda among the peasantry, was released yesterday on the demand of a crowd of 7,000 peasants, who, in the vicinity, are of Cossack origin. Ilyin already was on a train half-way to Tsarsitsin when a mob arrived and threatened to destroy the station and kill the chief of police unless he recalled the train. This was done, and the Cossack peasants bore off Ilyin on their shoulders, singing the "Marseillaise" as they went.

Kazan, Aug. 22.—The governor estimates that \$600,000 more will be required to furnish relief in this province alone.

Very Grave.

Samara, Russia, Aug. 22.—The agrarian situation in this province is most grave. Disorders are prevalent in numerous districts and troops have been requisitioned to restore order in three localities where firing is going on. Many have been killed. The peasants have seized the Kozloff estate, who recently seized and occupied the land, have returned the property to its owners. A strike of factory hands has begun in Samara, and a number of agitators have been arrested.

TIGER WILL TAKE STROLL

Will First Be Muzzled and Boots Placed Upon His Feet.

New York, Aug. 22.—Rajah, the royal Bengal tiger, pet of the little folks at the Bronx Zoo, is to be treated as no other captive man-eater has ever been. He is to have regular exercise to restore his health and strength. A famous Chicago naturalist examined him a few days ago, and said exercise was the only cure for his drooping spirits.

Exercise is an easier remedy to prescribe than to administer when a huge tiger is the patient, but the Zoo directors have hit upon a plan which is to be carried into effect for the first time next Sunday. Rajah has been measured for a steel muzzle, fitted with strong leather straps. Immense leather boots with toe clips of steel will also be made to cover his wicked claws. A stout collar and 60 yards of steel chain will complete the equipment for the exercise.

A spot has been selected in Bronx Park, where there is plenty of grass and shade, and if the tiger takes kindly to the fresh air cure the outings will occur daily. Armed guards will be on duty while his highness suns himself.

One Much Labeled Is Being Deared—Headed to President Roosevelt.

St. Paul, Minn., Aug. 21.—Local express offices are on the lookout for a "deadhead" package labeled "Roosevelt's Big Stick," which is going around the country, to the great delight of jokers. The package was in Aberdeen, S. D., on Sunday, and was shipped thither.

Attached to the "big stick" are about 200 labels, bearing various inscriptions from different cities in Iowa, Michigan, Ohio, Missouri, Texas and Colorado. The package is now headed for the eastern states, and will ultimately end its journey at the White House. An agent of the United States Express Company at Des Moines started the article on its travels.

SYRIAN BRIGANDS

Londoners Do Well at the O. R. A. Matches.

Washington, Aug. 22.—Brigandage is so common near Smyrna, Syria, that Americans have appealed repeatedly to the American consulate there for protection against brigands in the florid roads and tobacco plantations adjoining the city, and the foreign population is moving into the city from the suburbs because of the fear that the brigandage, which has visited only upon the Ottoman subjects so far, will be extended to the foreign population.

The unsatisfactory condition in Smyrna are detailed in a dispatch to the state department from Ernesta Magnifico, American vice-consul to that city. Outlawry is said to exist in Aidin vilayet, one of the suburbs of Smyrna to a greater extent than in 20 years. Within a few months practically all the wealthy Ottomans have moved out of the suburbs, and the English consul has posted a notice that British subjects who go into the interior do so at their peril.

STENSLAND CAUGHT IN OLD MEXICO

Fugitive President of Wrecked Chicago Bank Corralled at Last.

Chicago, Aug. 22.—The Record-Herald says: A private dispatch received in Chicago from El Paso at midnight reported positively the arrest of Paul O. Stensland, fugitive president of the wrecked Milwaukee Avenue State Bank, at Aguas Calientes, Mexico.

FATAL CRASH AT TORONTO DEPOT

A C. P. R. Fireman Killed in a Rear-End Collision This Morning.

Toronto, Aug. 22.—Through some misunderstanding of orders the C. P. R. 7:50 train for Hamilton crashed into the rear of the G. T. R. train for Montreal shortly after leaving the Union station this morning. Fireman Wm. Atkinson, of the C. P. R. train, was killed, and a number of passengers were shaken up, but no other person was killed or seriously injured. The G. T. R. train was waiting for the signal to start, when the accident occurred. Several cars were badly smashed.

CHINESE PIRATES Their Predations Blamed to Laxity of the Viceroy.

London, Aug. 21.—The renewed activity of Chinese pirates has prompted the Chinese Association of Hong Kong to publish in full the resolution recently adopted on this subject, and which, for some reason, has hitherto been issued only in part. Its text is as follows:

"The Hong Kong branch of the China Association desires to record its opinion that the recent outrages on shipping on the West River are directly due to lax administration on the part of the Viceroy of Canton; to impress upon the London branch the need of making representations to the Chinese authorities, and to acknowledge the promptness and energy of the measures taken by his Majesty's government, which have been successful in lessening the Chinese authorities are induced to exterminate piracy, there can be no guarantee that the evils complained of will not recur."

At the recent meeting at which this resolution was passed the chairman indicated the administration of the Viceroy of Canton, and characterized his attitude to representative foreign rights as casual to a degree. The Viceroy, he said, had come under the influence of the new wave of chauvinism, which was sweeping the empire from one end of the empire to the other. He had failed to fulfill the functions of his high office, and he had set the real culprit. The state of affairs was intolerable. The Viceroy, said the chairman, was unfit for the post, and he urged his immediate removal. On this point all the civil and mercantile communities of British and other nationalities, as well as the Chinese themselves, were, he said, unanimous.
