U. S. AMBASSADOR TELLS AMERICANS TO LEAVE AUSTRIA

SHOULD LONDON REFUSE \$22,500 TO KEEP ONE EXPANDING INDUSTRY AND SPEND \$100,000 FOR NEW ONE?

The question of whether the Hunt Mills are to remain in London still hangs in the balance.

It may be taken for granted that the Hunts do not wish to leave London. They are an old London family, with London traditions and London associations. They have developed their business in this city, although, as is often the case, their local trade has not been as extensive as it might have been.

The Hunts have asked the city to purchase their present property for the sum of \$22,500, with \$5,000 cash and the balance to be taken out in power for the big new mill. The city would get about five acres in land, the present mill premises, the power development and certain other

The utilities manager has not been inclined to favor the p to the present time. The power rights are not regarded by the manager Mr. Buchanan, as representing a serious increase in power, although it is admitted that 100 horsepower could be developed. It is also realized that some land desirable for hydro extension purposes is in sight. But up to the present there has been no getting down to brass tacks on the subject. Mr. Buchanan reported as an engineer, and did only his duty. As a matter of fact, the problem should be one for the industrial depart ment and the council, rather than the utilities commission

PAY \$100,000 FOR ANOTHER MILL?
