ONE, POSSIBLY TWO, SHIPS LOST IN THE STORM ON SUPERIOR

The H. E. Runnels Breaks Up On Rocks. CREW IS RESCUED

Ore Carrier John Owen Also Thought To Have Foundered.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Mich., Nov. 15.—One steamer, the H. E. Runnels, is known to have been lost, and another, as yet unidentified, is believed by mariners here to be foundered in the storm that has been raging over Lake Superior for three days.

The Runnels, a 1,000-ton ore carrier, was last sighted on Wednesday night, grounded early today and bounded to pieces shortly after the crew of seventeen had been rescued by means of a life line.

The second vessel is believed to be the John Owen, an ore carrier, which has not been sighted since Wednesday. So far as is known here tonight all other steamers have been accounted for.

Officers of the Whiten, which arrived today, reported sighting wreckage ten miles off Manitowish Point. Because of the high sea and the blinding snowstorm they were unable to identify the wreckage, they reported. According to their story, however, they made out a wrecked lifeboat, a portion of a wrecked pilot-house and what appeared to be the body of a man held up by a life preserver.

Others saw nothing. One report that they sighted no wreckage, but this may be due to the heavy snowfall and the fact that the wind had driven the wreckage out of their course.

Lake can be accomplished in the way of a search for the Owen until the storm abates. The vessel was in command of Capt. George B. Deham and carried a crew of twenty.

The steamer Republic arrived here today after having escaped a disaster in the high seas. She was forced to hug the shore for two days, and the crew, who were in the light of their own experiences officers declared it was quite possible that the vessel would have been wrecked had it not been for the comparatively light seas.

Although a number of steamers arrived here in the last few weeks covered with ice and considerably battered, the Runnels' wreck was the only one lost this season in "the graveyard of the lakes."

CHICAGO LIFE-SAVER SHOWS HEROISM IN DIRECTING RESCUE

SAULT STE. MARIE, Nov. 14.—Keeper John Anderson of the Chicago life-saving station is the hero of the mariners on the great lakes tonight. The story of his heroism in taking charge of the rescue work of the wrecked steamer M. E. Runnels, which was pounded to pieces on the shores of Lake Superior, is one that will live in the history of life-saving work on Lake Superior.

When the Runnels was driven ashore this morning in a mountainous sea it found the Grand Marais life-saving crew without a leader, due to the illness of Keeper Benjamin Truesdale. John Anderson was in Grand Marais at the time the Runnels was wrecked. He immediately took charge of the rescue work.

The seventeen men comprising the crew of the Runnels were helpless with a sea rolling over the vessel and everything coated with great layers of ice. The gale struck the reefs at about 7 o'clock this morning and began to break up almost immediately. Anderson put the crew of the E-438 on duty with the coast guardmen, rigged up the beach apparatus and with a single shot sent a line over the wrecked vessel. A breeches buoy was sent to the ship, but it broke solidly so the cable and could not be used.

Great seas smashed over the pier, and the rescue work was floundering. Anderson was in charge and nothing the steering car made four trips out and back, taking off every one of the crew.

Anderson was the only man who was not lashed to his seat in the surfboat. He was swept overboard three times, but each time managed to crawl back into the tiny craft and continue his work of rescue.

His Sweet Tooth Wins Wile Decree

Demand for Frosted Cake and Pie Breaks Up Home.

Adrian, Mich., Nov. 14.—Frosted cakes, pies and buns that led to a spend more than his share of the family cash for guns, brought a state of disaffection in the home life of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Schuler. Mrs. Schuler told Judge Hart Friday in her suit for divorce that her husband had been stoned upon having a piece of frosted cake and a half pie in his dinner pail every day, and that if the cake did not happen to be frosted he wouldn't look at it.

Mrs. Schuler, however, hadn't kept up the high cost of frosting, and his wife asserted that she was allowed only \$15 every two weeks with which to satisfy his sweet tooth and at the same time run the house and buy clothes for herself and child.

The husband filed a cross bill, but it was dismissed and the court awarded the decree to Mrs. Schuler.

TRANSFER CLEARANCE STAFF. John N. BELGIUM IS AWARDED 35 GERMAN SHIPS

Prize Court Decides On 150,000 Tons of Shipping.

Antwerp, Nov. 15.—The prize court has decided that 53 German boats, aggregating 150,000 tons, seized by the Belgian authorities in 1914 in the port of Antwerp, are lawful prizes of Belgium.

SUPREME COUNCIL DISCUSSES AWARDED OF TANK STEAMERS

Paris, Nov. 15.—The supreme council yesterday discussed disposition of four oil tank steamers which are in German ports, and which have been the subject of much controversy, in which the supreme council was involved.

Nine of these steamers belonged to German subsidiary companies of the Standard Oil Company before the beginning of the war, but were sold to German companies in a transaction which the American custodian of enemy property questioned. Pending settlement of the matter through judicial proceedings, the American peace delegation desires to have these tankers operated either by German or American crews for two round trips to the United States in order to supply German industries with oil. The European allies say this operation of the matter is impossible as far as German crews are concerned, as Germany should not be allowed to operate ships before there is a complete ratification of the peace treaty. These allies desire the ships allocated to Britain, Belgium and France in order to give employment to sailors of those nations now under the military of transport. No decision has been reached in the premises.

JOINT CONTROL OF BRITISH RAILWAYS ALMOST CERTAIN

Proposal To Establish Railway Labor Board Is Submitted.

London, Nov. 15.—It is understood that the executive of the National Union of Railwaymen has virtually agreed to accept the government's proposal that railwaymen take membership in a committee management for the railways, and that joint control of the railways is a certainty of the immediate future.

Meanwhile the Daily Mail's labor correspondent says that the railway workers have secured very momentous concessions, which justify him in believing that peace in the railway industry is definitely in sight.

The future management of the railways, according to this writer, will be in the hands of a joint managing committee now under the military of transport, to which the railway unions will appoint two representatives. It is further proposed to establish a railway labor board, consisting of four representatives of the railway managers, four union appointees and four "railway users."

PARIS GRIPPED BY EARLIEST BLIZZARD EVER EXPERIENCED

Transportation Facilities Are Crippled by Severe Storm.

Paris, Nov. 15.—A blizzard struck the Paris region last night. Six to ten inches of snow fell and the storm continued with unabated violence. The central markets are practically deserted, and some trains from the north have been stalled altogether. All overland telegraphic communication with Spain has been interrupted.

This is the earliest blizzard on record in Paris, adding greatly to the discomfort and misery from lack of coal and transportation difficulties.

EDITOR OF HERALD DIES. New York, Nov. 15.—Thomas A. Hamilton, 68, editor of the New York Herald, died at his home here last night, after an illness of several months. He was connected with the Herald for more than a quarter of a century, serving for many years as financial editor. Until six months ago, when his health failed, he was the chief editorial writer.

Montreal, Nov. 15.—The Grand Army of Canada, Vimy Post No. 4, at an executive meeting last evening, passed a resolution asking the Government to take immediate action against bolshevism in Canada.

HALF A MILLION PERSONS IN CAUCASUS REGION WILL STARVE UNLESS RELIEF COMES SOON

No Harvest, Cattle, Clothing or Medicine in Devastated Area—People Living a Terrible Existence—Food Supplies Will Only Last Until December—Thousands in Bread Lines.

Paris, Nov. 15.—Half a million persons will starve in the Caucasus this winter unless immediate relief be provided, in the opinion of William N. Haskell, allied high commissioner in Armenia, who left Paris last night for Tiflis, after having conferred with delegates to the peace conference for the past two weeks. One million Russian Armenians and 300,000 Turkish Armenians are now living a terrible existence in the Armenian republic, he says.

There will be no harvest this year; there are no cattle; houses have been destroyed, and there is neither medicine nor clothing, according to Col. Haskell, who says the homeless families are living in desperate poverty. "The food program of the inter-allied relief committee, headed by Herbert C. Hoover, is finished," adds the commissioner, "and the last supply of food stuffs furnished by that organization and by committees for relief in the near East will be exhausted in December."

Twenty thousand orphans are totally supported in 49 orphanages. Eight hundred beds are provided in hospitals. We have maintained bread lines and soup kitchens, which have supported countless thousands. In Alexandropol, alone, 12,000 undernourished children are crowded into compounds by Armenian officials, and we take care of as many as possible.

During my visit of inspection I saw 23 children carried out of one compound dead. We rescued the remainder.

Britain's Greatest Battleship Cost 5 Million Sterling

London, Nov. 15.—Walter Long stated yesterday in the House of Commons that the cost of the battleship Hood, exclusive of guns and ammunition amounted to over five millions sterling. H. M. S. Hood was launched in August, 1918, and is the first capital ship built since the battle of Jutland. The old majestic type of ship cost under one million sterling; the dreadnought cost nearly two millions.

SIR MICHAEL CACHIN TENDERS RESIGNATION

Hon. Richard Squires Is Called Upon To Form Newfoundland Cabinet.

ROMANIAN LEAVE BUDAPEST, HORTHY'S TROOPS ENTER CITY

Martial Law Invoked To Deal With Worst Crimes.

Budapest, Friday, Nov. 14.—Evacuation by the Rumanian troops of Budapest is going on without incident. The minister of justice has placarded the city with announcements that martial law will be invoked to deal with acts of high treason, murder, pillage or arson. The entry of the Hungarian army under Gen. Horthy will take place on Saturday morning.

I. W. W. MEMBERS ARE BEING ROUNDED UP ALL ALONG THE COAST

U. S. Authorities Determined To Stamp Out Radical Element. MANY ARE JAILED

Headquarters of Men of Bolshevik Tendencies Are Searched for Evidence.

San Francisco, Cal., Nov. 15.—Raids on industrial workers of the world and other radical organizations began today the result of the killing of four former men at Contra Costa, Wash., last Tuesday, continued during the night and down the Pacific coast, and as a result scores of additional prisoners were in custody today.

Some of them face charges of criminal syndicalism, some of inciting to riot and others of vagrancy. Three persons, alleged members of the radical order, sustained injuries in one raid, which necessitated their removal to a hospital.

At Los Angeles a number of former service men, said to be mainly members of the American Legion, broke into I. W. W. headquarters, cut and bruised with clubs three men, and wrecked the place before the police could respond to a riot call. In San Francisco the "People's Institute" and I. W. W. headquarters were raided by the police and the men held in default of \$1,000 bonds on charges of vagrancy.

These raids followed receipt of information, the police said, that school children were visiting the People's Institute and obtaining radical literature, which they carried home. All I. W. W. members, says the police captain conducting the raid, must leave San Francisco or go to jail.

PRINCE MAKING 3 DAY STAY AT U. S. WINTER RESORT

White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., Nov. 15.—The Prince of Wales and his suite arrived here today for a three-day stay. The royal guest will remain incognito during his visit.

TURKS CHARGED WITH BRUTALITY BY GREEKS

Salonika, Nov. 15.—Reports from Constantinople state that brutal measures are being adopted by the Turkish element of pro-German tendency against Christian partisans of the Entente in Asia Minor. The Turkish element in Asia Minor is said to be much disturbed and bloodthirsty. The village of Kordich has been devastated by the bands. Twenty Greeks are unaccounted for in the Adalia region. The Greeks in the Nigde district are said to be emigrating en masse. A number of Greeks at Bursa are reported to have been enrolled in force and a fortnight until a ransom had been paid.

USE HINDY AS "FIRE SOUP TO A BOIL"

New York, Nov. 14.—There are seven men to every woman seeking a matrimonial mate in the United States, so the girls everywhere may as well cheer up. That was one of the discoveries made through a raid on the New Hope Matrimonial Society, the biggest first aid to cupid in the country, according to the findings of Police Commissioner Ellen O'Grady today.

Majority Socialists Will Hold Mass Meetings On Sunday.

Berlin, Nov. 15.—Three mass meetings have been called for Sunday by the Majority Socialists for the purpose, the announcement states, of "ousting the police authorities from their seats." It is declared an attempt is being made to use the presence in Berlin of Field Marshal von Hindenburg as a "fire brand" to excite the masses. The police are being urged to take action to prevent this.

HOLLAND WILL ENTER LEAGUE AS SOON AS TREATY IS RATIFIED

Minister of Foreign Affairs Makes This Announcement in Parliament.

The Hague, Nov. 15.—Jonkheer van Kerkhove, minister of foreign affairs, has announced in the Chamber that Holland intends to enter the League of Nations immediately after ratification of the peace treaty is concluded.

"Big Six" Typo Union Will Force Printers To Return To Work

New York, N. Y., Nov. 15.—News-papers across the country today took the initiative to force the trade union members of the printing trade to return to work, and to submit their demands to arbitration. The movement originated with the Chicago Tribune, which was followed by the New York Tribune and was endorsed by the Chicago Tribune today. Resolutions adopted ask that the men be ordered back to work and that it was said unless officials of the "Big Six" adopt a program that may lead to a settlement, international officers will be called in to take charge of the situation.

The newspaper chains have assisted the strikers by donating ten per cent of their wages for seven weeks since the vacation originated.

VICTORY LOAN WILL GO BEYOND HALF MILLION MARK, IS OPINION HELD BY CAMPAIGN LEADERS

Three Hundred and Six Places in Ontario Have Now Won the Prince of Wales' Honor Flag—Several Firms Who Subscribed Heavily At Opening of Campaign Increase Their Subscriptions.

Toronto, Nov. 15.—Confidence that the half billion mark will have been passed in the Victory Loan campaign when subscriptions close tonight, is expressed at Loan headquarters here. The latest returns give the total for all Canada as \$478,795,778, but this does not cover any of the provinces to date. Ontario's figures being up to only Friday night, Quebec, up to Thursday night, and the rest of the country to Wednesday night.

The Dominion special subscriptions committee points out, also, that many firms that had subscribed early in the campaign have made a further subscription. Yesterday, for instance, the Manufacturers' Life Insurance Company, which early in the campaign subscribed \$5,000,000, yesterday contributed a further \$1,000,000.

The number of places in Ontario, which have won the Prince of Wales honor flag is now 305, sixty-three having been added to the list Friday. Three more units have joined the ranks of the millionaire class. These are: Prince Edward, with \$1,011,000; East York, with \$1,010,300; and Carleton, with \$1,006,050. A subscription of \$500,000 from the Western Canada Flour mills is announced.

ENTENTE NATIONS TO GET SOUVENIRS FROM TRUCE FLAG

Washington, Nov. 14.—The white flag that preceded the German envoys when they approached the French lines at La Chapelle, November 7, 1918, to receive the allied armistice terms from Marshal Foch, has been cut up by the French Government. It bears an inscription telling its story and also a testimonial from France to Belgium for the heroic stand taken by Belgium in the defense of "Liberty and Right."

ERZBERGER BRANDED AS MAN RESPONSIBLE FOR GERMANY'S FALL

Teutons Object To Speeches Favoring the League of Nations.

Berlin, Nov. 15.—Demonstrators last night stormed a meeting arranged by Matthias Erzberger, vice-premier and minister of finance, at which speeches favoring the league of nations were made. The police cleared the hall and quiet was restored.

Professor Wilhelm Schuler, chairman of the meeting, was insulted and threatened with violence. Deputy Lawrence attacked Herr Erzberger, saying he was responsible for the Empire's ruin. The meeting concluded in confusion, the audience slinging topical and national songs.

ST. JOHN LONGSHOREMEN DEMAND ADVANCE OF 20 CENTS PER HOUR

Conference Held Between Shipping Representatives and Men.

St. John, N. B., Nov. 14.—An advance of twenty cents an hour in wages is demanded by the longshoremen of the port of St. John for the coming winter. The present rate, fixed a year ago, is sixty cents. A conference was held between the representatives of the shipping federation this afternoon, at which the shipping interests were represented by Thomas Robb of Montreal and Capt. John T. Walsh, manager of the C. P. O. S., with the local steamship agents also present. As a counter-offer, the necessary advance in wages was discussed at a meeting of the longshoremen this evening. At the close of the meeting officials of the union declined to announce their decision, until it had been communicated to the supporting federations. The coal handlers who now receive 75 cents an hour, also were asking for a raise and the demand also is being discussed by the interests involved.

INTER-ALLIED ECONOMIC COUNCIL MEETING IN ROME NOVEMBER 21-22

Distribution of Foodstuffs Among Allies Will Be Discussed.

Rome, Nov. 14.—The inter-allied economic council will meet here November 21-22. Italy will be represented in the conference by Signor Schanzer, minister of the treasury; Carlo Ferraris, minister of industry and commerce; Count Volpi, Signor Dante and Salvatore Orlando.

The representatives of Great Britain will be: George H. Roberts, food controller and Sir Eric Geddes, minister of transportation. Etienne Clemel, minister of commerce and Louis Loucheur, minister of reconstruction, will be the French delegates. Members of the Belgian Government will represent Belgium.

Chief among the questions to be discussed are the just distribution of raw materials among the Allies, maritime law, the cost of supplies for Italy and food supply for the various countries, especially with regard to Austria.
