NORTH TORONTO, Aug. 24.—A special meeting of the school board was held to-night, when the secretary-treasurer gave the financial statement, showing that the board's estimate for the year is \$10,000. So far \$5,069.83 has been spent and by the time the salaries are paid for the balance of the year and the coal and other outstanding accounts settled, the appropriation will be exhausted. The board decided to reopen the schools on Tuesday, Sept. 8 A largely signed petition from rate-payers of Bedford Park was presented asking for the formulating of a plan whereby a school room could be opened at that point, as there are about fifty children of school age, affecting forty-five families, in the district. It was shown that it is almost impossible for these children to attend the Eglinton school in winter time. The deputation suggested that the hall at Bedford Park Hotel be rented for the purpose. Mr. Town, the proprietor of the hotel, offered if the board fixed up the room suitable for a school, to give it free of charge for one year, or if allowed \$300 a year he would put the hall in shape, supply coal and act as caretaker. 
