

Curling Caledonians Are in Line

NOTE AND COMMENT

There was no doubt about the tenor of the meeting of the Caledonian curlers yesterday afternoon. Everyone wanted to stick, and the old Tankard skills will not be re-elected those who take their place may meet with better success. Notable members present were William Rennie and William Ross, who were present at the organization meeting in the same building thirty-seven years ago, the records say it was a year later—1872; also W. D. McIntosh, who joined the next winter, and has been secretary ever since. All three were glad to resume office. Mr. Rennie would be glad to regale the younger generation at Grenadier Pond with coffee and cake, as he had the bottles of the beaumont on the open ice in Muller street in the early '70s. Willie Ross recounted the steps that led to the formation of the club. A link of leads, members of the old Toronto was organized, consisting of Gardner, Christie, Ramsay and himself as skip, all Scotchmen and calling themselves Caledonians, and after beating several of the older quartets decided to start out for themselves. They with Mr. Rennie and a few others purchased the lot on Mutual street, which was the beginning.

Of the ninety-two clubs in the Ontario Curling Association, the Caledonians are No. 18 in seniority, being organized the same year as London. Fergus is the original curling club of Ontario, dating back beyond the allotted span—1834—followed by the Toronto Club in 1837; Galt, 1838; Scarborough, 1839; Guelph, 1840; Paris, 1843; Dundas, 1853; Keene, 1861; Port Hope, 1861; Chatham, 1862; Hamilton-Thistles, 1863; Cobourg, 1864; St. Mary's, 1865; Thamesville, 1866; Walkerton, 1870; Woodstock, 1883; Lucknow, 1870; London, 1872, and Toronto Caledonians, 1872.

The Caledonians' move to Swansea is in the right direction, and already the old club is showing signs of increased activity. Many new members are about to join under the altered conditions, and it will be interesting to watch the progress of the Caledonians in Tankard and District and Reid cups, and the many other matches that will make up the new program.

Meanwhile the Granites are preparing for their elections to-night in real campaign style. A lively contest is on for the first vice-presidency.
