

SEVERAL TO BLAME.

Had Anyone Did His Duty, Wreck Wouldn't Have Happened.
Dr. A. S. Tilley, corner of Bowmanville, who conducted the inquest into the C. P. R. wreck at Sandbank, writes The World:
"The verdict in the Edward Findlay inquest said 'employees' of the company, not 'employe,' as reported.
"The jury thought that from the evidence taken there were several employees who did not live up to the rules of the company. Had any one of these lived up to the rules of the company the accident would not have happened."

AN APOLOGY TO THE KAISER

New York World Admits It Printed "Stupidly Absurd" Interview.
NEW YORK, Nov. 30.—The New York World, which recently published what it explains it honestly believed to be a correct synopsis of the interview given by the German Emperor to Dr. William Bayard Hale, and subsequently suppressed, has sent the following cablegram to Chancellor Von Buelow:
"After a painstaking investigation, The New York World finds no convincing basis of fact for its published synopsis of the Hale interview with his majesty the German Emperor. It accepts your verdict that the alleged interview ascribed to the emperor are stupidly absurd words, which he cannot have uttered. As a matter of simple justice to the German Emperor and the German people, The World prints an editorial leader Monday morning, expressing its sincere regret at the publication of a synopsis which it regards as misleading and mischievous. It was an honest mistake committed merely thru over-zeal without the knowledge of the proprietor or chief editor, and so late at night that the article did not appear in the first edition. Proofs of the synopsis sent to the author of the interview had been corrected in his own handwriting, and this was naturally accepted as evidence that the article as printed was personally approved by him."
After reading The World's explanation, Dr. Hale made public a statement, in which he said that prior to its publication he had warned the representative of The World that the pretended synopsis was "a fake from beginning to end."
