parently any mystery surrounding death of Albert Neal, florist, and housekeeper, Mrs. Florence Dunn, who were found dead in Mr. Neal's apartment, 123 University avenue, yesterday afternoon, has been cleared up by the filing of death certificates stating that death was due to asphyxiation. Inspectors from the Consumers' Gas company, on examining the gas water meter in the kitchen yesterday, found a fuel plugged and evidence of back-drafting.

Coroner Jukes Johnson finished the autopsy on the bodies yesterday, but refused to divulge his finding until the date of the inquest next Wednesday.

Warned to Steer Clear of "Invalid Wine" in the Future

When they appeared in the police court yesterday on a charge of being drunk, James Farewell and R. Flinty told the court that the cause of their inebriation was a few bottles of "invalid wine," but were unable to state where they purchased the liquid. Farewell said that he had taken three-quarters of a bottle, while Flinty confessed to drinking the liquid so much that he "put away" four or five quart bottles, costing 75 cents each.

Warned to steer clear of "invalid wine" in future, Flinty and Farewell were discharged.

THREE IMPLICATED IN THEFT CHARGES

Louis Hastings, Herbert Creller and Edward Quinn appear in court.

CONSPIRACY ALLEGED

Said to Have Plotted Robbery From the Canadian Pacific Railway.

In the police court yesterday, Herbert Creller, alias Bert Carruthers, shipper for the Taylor-Forbes Company, Ltd., and Louis Hastings, C.P.R. yardman, were respectively charged with stealing a quantity of liquor, household furniture and other articles from the C. P. R. and receiving the same. They were committed for trial. The case against Edward Quinn, another Taylor-Forbes employee, who is believed to have been involved in the thefts, was adjourned a week for further investigation.

Armando de Gasparis, a young Italian driver for the Taylor-Forbes Company, who had the charges against him withdrawn, testified against Creller, Hastings and Quinn, with the result that they were detected by C. P. R. Detective Harry Harper, and arrested by Acting Detective Nicholls. It is claimed that about \$5000 worth of whiskey, furniture and glassware was stolen from the cars at the Parkdale siding.

Gasparis stated that Creller had asked him to deliver goods to 22 and 72 Grenadier road. Hastings lives at 22, while a man named Drury, for whom a warrant has been issued, lives at 72. Three parcels were delivered at the Hastings' home and one at Drury's. Gasparis further swore that he had delivered three barrels of stuff to T. A. Norris, who has plumbers' supply store on Vernal avenue.

Acting Detective Nicholls swore that Creller admitted receiving goods stolen from the C. P. R. to re-ship them to homes on Grenadier road. Hastings denied stealing or receiving anything when arrested, although some of the stuff was found at his home.

ELEMENTARY EDUCATION FOR RETURNED SOLDIERS

Course of Instruction to Start Next Wednesday at the Convalescent Home.

RECOGNIZE SERVICES

Work Undertaken by Soldiers' Aid in Conjunction With Board of Education.

Commencing next Wednesday, a course of instruction in elementary education will be started in the convalescent homes of the city for returned soldiers. The work will be first undertaken in the College Street Convalescent Home, and the Bishop Strachan Home, and the training will be in the hands of two thoroughly competent and qualified teachers. The number of teachers will be increased as the classes increase in size.

This work is being undertaken by the Soldiers' Aid Commission in conjunction with the board of education. W. D. McPherson, M.L.A., chairman of the Soldiers' Aid Commission, yesterday explained the nature and purpose of the work to be undertaken. "It is for the purpose of recognizing in a small way the service that these men have rendered to the empire, and as a reward as far as can be done to make their condition in life as prosperous or even more prosperous than it was before they went overseas. In other words, it is that the men shall not be losers by the sacrifice that they have made, that this work is undertaken."

The start will be made with elementary training, and personal survey will be made and the qualifications of each man who desires to take the course will be looked into to learn what his present training will adapt him for. From that his education will develop into such technical training as will seem to be necessary in the case of each. Every injured soldier is eligible for this course of instruction, and it is expected that a large number will avail themselves of this opportunity.

It is the intention of the commission to establish similar classes in different cities throughout the province, as London, Hamilton, Kingston and Ottawa. Dr. F. W. Merchant, director of technical education in Ontario, accompanied by T. B. Kilmer, vocational officer representing the military hospital commission, will visit London today for the purpose of investigating the situation in that city and organizing classes. It is expected that classes will be commenced in each of the cities above named about the middle of next week. W. W. Nichol, principal of the Ottawa Technical School, has been engaged as general supervisor of the work in Ontario.

Bank Appreciates Good Work of the Fire Brigade

A token of appreciation for the fine work of the firemen in extinguishing the small fire which broke out in the basement of the Home Bank of Canada, Wednesday afternoon, has been received by Deputy Chief Russell of the fire department in the shape of a cheque for \$25 from C. Smith, the bank's chief accountant. The money will go to the firemen's benefit fund.
