HOT YESTERDAY

Thermometer Went a Hundred in the Shade and Then Some.

NO RAIN IN SIGHT

Toronto Sweltered on Hottest Day in Three Years.

The torrid zone had nothing on Toronto yesterday. Geographers may tell us that the most intense heat strikes near the equator. We don't believe it. It hit Toronto yesterday to the tune of 100 in the shade, which is a season's record.

And the worst is not yet. There is no probability of rain, and falling that relief the heat will stay with us for a week anyway. The weatherman says that if the thermometer goes anywhere today it will be up.

Only once in the memory of the meteorological officials has the temperature been higher than that of Sunday. In 1911 it touched 103. But the humidity wasn't as intense as that of today. The weatherman is predicting heat yesterday probably takes the cake.

THREE DEATHS DUE
TO INTENSE HEAT

Dr. McLaughlin, John Hartigan and Martha Little Were the Victims.

MANY PROSTRATIONS

Mrs. Hampton Collapsed on Wharf and Taken to Hospital.

Saturday and Sunday's extreme heat was responsible for three deaths and a number of prostrations. Sunday afternoon the mercury climbed to 104 degrees in the shade, and Toronto sweltered. Dr. Ernest McLaughlin, 14 Garnet avenue, died on Saturday at Port Dover, where he had gone on vacation. He was born in Cartwright Township, Durham County, 39 years ago. He was a school teacher in his younger days, and graduated in medicine at Toronto University five years ago, since which time he has been a resident of Toronto. He leaves a widow and one child. He will be buried at Port Dover today.

Heart weakness, accentuated by the heat, was the cause of the sudden death of John W. Hartigan, 50 years of age, of 300 George street, about nine o'clock yesterday morning.

Mr. Hartigan was unmarried, and lived at the above address, the widow of which was a Mrs. Alex. Patterson, who resided with Hartigan. He was awakened by the heat in his room, and went to call on Dr. Cook, Jarvis street and Wilton avenue. He returned with the doctor Hartigan was dead. The body was taken to the morgue, but a photograph was not coming.

Martha Little, 38 years of age, of 1 Alton street, was found dead in her home about 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon by her 17-year-old son. She had been ailing with Bright's disease for some time past. Coroner Russell was informed of the death, and decided that an inquest was unnecessary.

FATAL ACCIDENT
AT NIAGARA FALLS

Two Persons Killed When Trolley Car Crashed Into Auto.

THREE OTHERS HURT

Family From Philadelphia on Tour Thru Canada Were the Victims.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., July 29.—A fatal collision between an automobile and an Niagara, St. Catharines and Toronto electric car took place at four o'clock this afternoon on Stanley street crossing, just north of Fairview cemetery, when David and L. E. Roland, brothers, with their wives and sister, all in a touring car, attempted to cross ahead of an approaching electric car from St. Catharines bound for this city.

The trolley car caught the automobile squarely on the rear end, smashing it into wreckage and throwing the four occupants into the air. The young lad, Brooks, leaped from the car escaping with few bruises. The two men, seated in the front of the car, escaped with few scratches, while the three women were less fortunate, being in the rear seat and getting the full impact of the trolley. Mrs. Olive Roland, wife of David Roland, age 32 years, received a terrific gash over the forehead penetrating into the brain, while the sister, Miss Sadie Roland, age 27 years, suffered the impact so severely as to cause her death.
