ION. A. L. SIFTON **DIES AT OTTAWA**

Secretary of State for Canada Succumbs Suddenly to Long Illness.

Ottawa, Jan. 21.—(By Canadian Press) .- Hon. A. L. Sifton, secretary of tate for Canada, died at 8.30 this morning at his apartment at the chateau Laurier. A short time before Mr. Sifton had lapsed into unconsciousness. With him when he died were his son and Senator W. J. Harner, who was a close friend. On Tuesday, after a consultation of spe-cialists, hope was expressed for the ecovery of Mr. Sifton, who suffered from arterio sclerosis (hardening of the arteries), but another relapse early this morning ended fatally.

Ill for Some Weeks.

The deceased cabinet minister had

been ill for some weeks, and had been under the care of Dr. Campbell Laidlaw of Ottawa. On January 19 he suffered a relapse and specialists from Toronto were called in. Then it was announced that hope for his recovery

Sir Clifford Sifton, who is a younger rother of the deceased minister, and had been at his bedside more or less now for several days, returned to Toronto Thursday night, only to go back to Ottawa, accompanied by Lady Sifton, Friday afternoon, where the funeral arrangements are to be settled.



U. S. Congressman Draws Attention to Effect of Canadian Embargo.

Washington, Jan. 21.-The Fordney emergency tariff bill, now before congress, was designed as a panacea for all he ills from which farmers of the United States are suffering today, and works on the simple principle that United States farm products will bring large prices at home and abroad if the products of all other countries are kept out of the United States by a tariff wall prohibitively high.
