

MANY BIG FIELDS IN THE ALDERMANIC RACE

Sixty-Seven Candidates for Twenty-Four Seats—Eleven Out for Three Vacancies in Ward One—Ten for Ward Seven—Thirty Nominations for Sixteen Places on Board of Education—Keen Contests for Separate School Trusteeships.

The aldermanic race is off, with the big field of sixty-seven starters for twenty-four places in the eight wards of the city. For the board of education there are thirty candidates for sixteen seats, and of these forty were elected without opposition, among them being two of the former women members, Mrs. E. L. Groves and Miss C. R. Sullivan. Ward one has the entry of eight candidates for the aldermanic circle, ward seven with ten coming a close second.

All the former aldermen with two exceptions are running as candidates. Alderman Hiltz in ward one is out for a controllership, and Alderman Miskelly in ward eight has been compelled to retire on account of ill-health. Alderman McGrigge, who at one time had ambition for the board of control, is nominated both in wards three and four.

There was not a great deal of interest displayed by the public in the nominations, and with the exception of ward one, where there were no speeches, these all being reserved for the hustings.

That the progressive section of the city, known as ward one, will not lack for choice in the selection of candidates for aldermanic and board of education honors, was evinced by the large number of separate nominations at Riverside College Institute yesterday.
