The newly formed athletic body, the Canadian Association Athletic League, which has been brought into being by the united efforts of all the Y.M. C.A. of Canada, held their first annua noon on the tidy well kept Varsity field. Ordinarily it takes a conside able length of time-years perhaps from a new track and athletic associa tion, and in most cases the first gam held in Toronto in years has prove Saturday. The attendance was large; the grand stand was well filled with a sprinkling of ladies and many gentlemen. The games were well organized; things were run off well in time; the rule was adopted that any entry not present to compete when the event was called would be scratched. This was a Saturday regulation and it worked wonders in setting things going on time. As a result there were no waits. The management committee deserve the utmost praise for the alacrity and precision with which they worked thru their long entry list of over 150. Everything was over by six.

The entry list was certainly a remarkable and record breaking one; it included the best men in Canada. There were men present from the Montreal Athletic Association, and from various Y.M.C.A. thruout the Dominion. The exceptionally large entry line ach event worked. work all the harder. Marter won the 440 yards boys' race in good style; he also got third in the boys' 100 yard dash.
