Montreal, March 17—A special London cable says:—"We Canadian delegates to the Imperial press conference, said Sir Hugh Graham, of Montreal, to a London Mirror interviewer, "have had no opportunity yet of comparing notes or of even discussing conference matters by correspondence, but we sincerely hope that so magnificent an invitation as has been to sympathy. It is the more embarrassing because the strikers are government employes, and because it is impossible to fill the places of so many skilled operators at short notice.
