The Irish Pawnbrokers did not make a very deep impression at the Opera House last evening. The show which is a rewritten and revised edition of McKenna's "The Pawnbroker's Wedding Day" which visited St. John last year. Murphy and Mack, who have most of the fun making to do are fair types of the Irish comedian. Mr. Mack portrays the more refined type while Mr. Murphy revels in the terra cotta whippers of the burlesque Celt. Some of their jokes are new but the majority are tried and trusty friends. Mr. Murphy introduces a rather good singing and dancing turn. He dances well, and sings acceptably but the prancing knife could be used with advantage on one or two of his gags.
Violet Hinson is a bright little lady who provides much of the entertainment while Marie Dickman does a comical and balancing act with a chair which is really clever. On the whole the show is hardly up to the average of that class of entertainment. It will be presented again this evening and at two performances tomorrow.

The play was last acted in America by Madame Modjeska in 1892. Oscar Adler recently revived it for a run of seventy-three performances in the Adelphi Theatre London, playing An-

The Bernhardt tent at Dallas, Waco and Duluth; skating rinks at Savannah, Tampa, Jacksonville, Augusta, Atlanta, Fort Wayne, Winnipeg, Spokane, with plenty more to come; auditoriums, Kansas City, Omaha, Nashville, Chattanooga, Peoria, and then a few summer theatres. Little Rock, five miles from the city in a driving rain. Des Moines, Ingersoll Park Theatre, two miles and a half out; Scott, La Crosse, Park, three miles out; lively stable in Montgomery, Ala. (Date was cancelled however on account of other bookings), dining rooms, Royal Poinciana Hotel, Palm Beach. This date was also cancelled because of other bookings.
