Chilblains arises generally from defective circulation. Setting in wet shoes the heat of putting the feet close to the fire when they are very cold, and neglecting to take sufficient exercise, cause chilblains. Socks made of soft wash leather, if adopted before the cold weather sets in, will generally protect the feet from chilblains. As soon as any indication of chilblains appear, rub the affected part every night with soap, water, and common pepper-salt, or with an ointment composed of salt and horseradish. Great care should be taken that they are not suffered to break, as they then become only exceedingly painful, but difficult to heal.
