British schooner Melba, Captain Richards, which arrived in port last Saturday, from Brunswick, Ga., had 24782 feet of pitch pine lumber for Theo. Bell & Co.

Schooner Irma Bentley, Captain Carter, arrived in port today from Carrabelle, Florida, via Digby, with 1786 pieces of pitch pine lumber.

The British schooner Bennett, Captain Potter, arrived on Saturday from Baltimore with 434 tons of hard coal. This is the first cargo of hard coal from that port.

The Picford & Black West India line steamship Ororo, Captain Bale, arrived in port this morning from Halifax, Bermuda, Windward Islands and Demerara, with a general cargo, including 804 casks of molasses and 525 bags of sugar.

The semi-monthly payroll for civic employees was disbursed today, as follows:—Official, \$1,235.79; public works, \$408.34; market, \$113.69; police, \$1,084.96; fire, \$1,006.66; ferry, \$674.00. Total \$5,353.41.

ORDERS FOR CAMP ARE OUT TODAY

Militia Orders for Sussex Issued by Col. Humphrey—The Camp Make-up—Every Man Must Get Hair Cut

The militia orders for Camp Sussex were issued this morning from the office of the D. O. C., Col. W. Mc. Humphrey. The establishments call for the following units to encamp at the military grounds on June 28—Princess Louise Hussars, Col. Wedderburn; 4th brigade C. F. A., Lt. Col. Diblee commanding; 10th Woodstock Field Battery, Maj. W. J. Groat; 12th Newcastle Field Battery, Maj. Lawlor; 10th Field Battery, Moncton, Maj. Anderson; 1st Field Co. C. E., Lt. Col. Tompkins; Corps of Guides, 12th Infantry brigade, Lt. Col. Vines; No. 7 Co. Canadian Army Service Corps, Maj. Massey; No. 8 Army Medical Corps, Maj. T. D. Walker; Canadian Signal Corps, No. 8, Capt. J. B. Powers, and Canadian Ordnance Corps, Lt. Col. Armstrong.

The orders call for several advance parties to go to camp, some on Monday, June 27, others on Saturday, June 25. "H" Co. R. (S. H. of Fredericton, with the Canadian Army Service Corps of this city will leave on the 25th and have everything in readiness for the main bodies of troops, which will arrive until the following Tuesday afternoon, and in some cases not until Wednesday.

The camp this year is expected to be the largest for some time. It will be the first to be commanded by Col. Humphrey. Special attention will be given to military regulations and especially those of the various corps are admonished to see to it that their men conduct themselves in an orderly and soldierly manner, the officers themselves being held responsible for the maintenance of discipline.

Preparations locally for the camp are well advanced, and each corps is making active arrangements to attend. The Army Medical Corps on Friday night last attended the General Public Hospital and heard a lecture from the superintendent of nurses, Miss Hewitt, pertaining to hospital duties. A similar lecture will be given tomorrow night. This is a new feature, and will probably prove of material assistance in hospital work under canvas.

MATTERS OF INTEREST FOR ALDERMEN

Several Communications to Council as Well as the Permanent Payment Contract and Mispac Pulp Mill Lease

The monthly meeting of the common council will be held this afternoon, when the report of the boards and committees will be dealt with. Chief among the recommendations are those relating to the contract for permanent pavement, which is recommended to be given the Hasnam Paving Co., and the recommendation that Stetson Cutler & Co. be granted a renewal lease of the Mispac pulp mill at \$2,220 a year.

Among the communications are the following:—The secretary of the Exhibition Association writes asking the council to appoint a permanent special committee with power to deal with its building and grounds committee.

H. H. Pickett, attorney, writes on behalf of H. S. Gregory & Son, claiming that the city, in widening Charlotte street extension, took fifteen feet off the land leased to them by the Dominion government.

A. T. Barrett writes to suggest that he be commissioned to paint a portrait of His late Majesty King Edward VII. John M. Jenkins and other expressmen and carters write asking that there be a readjustment of license fees.

John A. Adams writes informing the council that, owing to his being obliged to leave the city, he will be unable to accept the position of appraiser on west side lots, formerly leased to W. Frank Halberway, M. P. P.
